

Nevada Eagles Meet At Fallon

Plans are being rapidly concluded for the annual convention of the State Aerie, Fraternal Order of Eagles, opening at Fallon June 17, for a three days' session, with full delegations indicated from all Aeries of the state, S. H. Cooper, state secretary, announced this week.

The convention this year will be of special interest, Cooper said, as it will commemorate the 25th, or silver, anniversary of the institution of the Nevada State Aerie. There will be a special program in recognition of the event, and 25 years of progress of the order in Nevada.

A special guest of honor at the convention will be Charles J. Chenu, past grand worthy president, and a widely known national leader of the order.

A tentative program outlined for the convention includes opening of the business session at 10 a. m. on June 17, and in the evening a class of candidates will be initiated for Fallon Aerie by the state officers. Friday evening there will be a banquet and boxing contest, open to entries from the various Aeries. The ritualistic and drill team contest by teams from the Nevada Aeries is scheduled for Saturday night, with the concluding event, the convention ball.

Regular business sessions will be held each day, with election and installation of officers.

State President C. D. Baker will preside at the convention.

It was stated that Yerington will send a large delegation to the Fallon meet, and will make a bid for the 1938 conclave.

Secretary Cooper announces that all Aeries of Nevada will appoint old age pension committees to cooperate in every way possible in the local administration of the law in their communities.

Calneva Lodge Reopens July 4

RENO — New Calneva Lodge will reopen at Lake Tahoe on July 4, it was announced today by James McKay and Norman Biltz, who said that reconstruction work on the resort, which was destroyed by fire last month is progressing rapidly and should be completed by June 28th.

Workmen are rushing construction twenty-four hours per day in three shifts and the work is being carried on under flood-lights at night. More than one hundred men are employed on the project, Blitz said.

The new Calneva will follow the same lines as the old resort, it is planned, but will be somewhat larger. Two large porches will be added. There will be an entrance lobby in the center of the building with separate entrances to the gambling rooms and bar and to the dining rooms.

City Commissioner Marble has been named mayor pro-tem in place of Jas. H. Down, whose term as commissioner has expired.

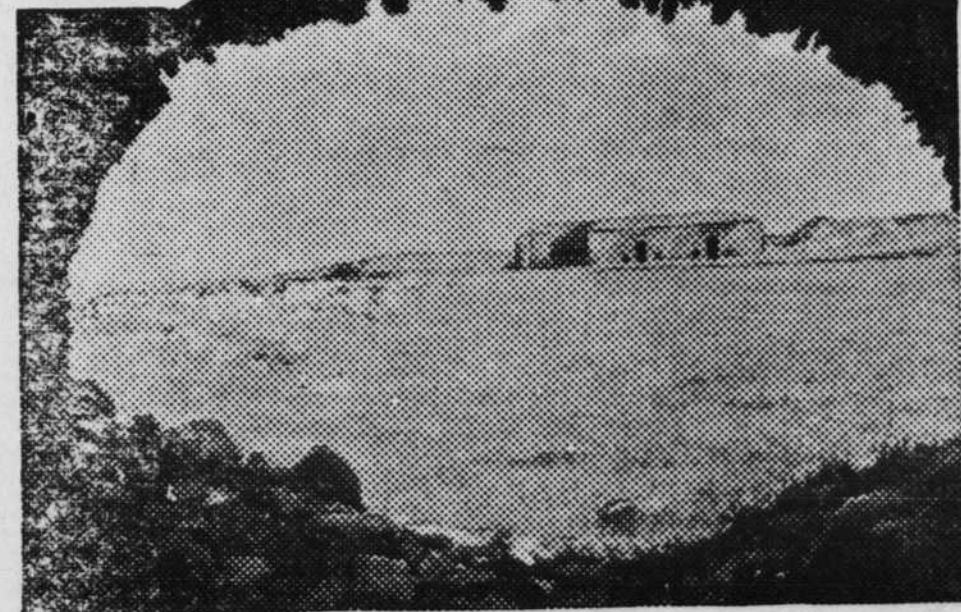

HIGHROADS OF HISTORY



THE histories of Massachusetts and Nova Scotia are inextricably linked by the names of "Louisbourg" and "Grand Pre." Both of these spots are located in Nova Scotia and are yearly the scenes of pilgrimages by many Americans. In 1745, under the command of a Boston merchant named Pepperell, 4,000 untrained troops from Massachusetts captured Fort Louisbourg on Cape Breton Island, then the strongest French fortress in North America. Two pictures of this Fort as it exists today are shown above. In 1745 also, Col. John Winslow of Massachusetts undertook the expulsion of the Acadians from Grand Pre, Nova Scotia, many of the exiles settling in Louisiana where their descendants still live. The story of this tragic chapter of history was told by Longfellow in his poem "Evangeline." Her statue is shown as it is to be seen in front of the Parish church at Grand Pre.
