Water supply for the 1400-ton cyanide leaching plant of the Brad-show Syndicate Inc. at Goldfield will be supplemented shortly from a deep drill hole that has been sunk in the Diamondfield section.

NEVADA QUICKSILVER YIELD 211 FLASKS

Quicksilver production in the United States declined last year narly 1000 flasks below the previ-ous year's output. Nevada in 1936 was credited by the Bureau of Mines with an output of 211 flasks of 76-pounds each, having a value of \$16,-863 and coming from 11 mines. Re-newed interest has lately been manifested in cinnabar prospects.

Nusser Woman Tries Suicide

Grace Nusser, under sentence to life imprisonment for the murder of her husband in Boulder City last April 27, took an overdose of sleep-ing tablets with suicidal intent last Moday evening. She was found un-conscious early Tuesday morning when Deputy Sheriff Ray Griffith and Warden Lewis of the state peni-tentiary went to prepare her for an early start to the prison.

After several days in the county hospital strapped to a bed the un-fortunate woman is recovering and will be taken to the prison as soon as possible.

Ely Advocates A New Highway

At the inter-state highway meeting held in Ely, State Highway En-gineer Robert A. Allen stated that the Nevada link of the proposed Highway No. 6 from Greeley, Colo-rado, to Delta, Utah, thence to Ely, Tonopah and via Montgomery Pass to California, will be completed by the end of next year provided Utah will agree to complete her portion of the route.

The routing of the proposed high-way east of Ely would be by way of the Lehman Cave highway to Delta, Utah.
