Maurice Duperrey, Paris, France, elected president of Rotary International at the twenty-eighth annual convention at Nice, France, which closed June 11. Duperrey, the first person to be elected to the presidency from Continental Europe, was president of the Paris club 1928-29; has been governor of the forty-ninth Rotary district; second vice-president of Rotary International and a member of the board of directors.

He is a prominent manufacturer of France; has visited almost every country in Europe and has made many trips to North and South America and North Africa. In addition to French he speaks and corresponds fluently in English, Spanish, German and Italian. He plans to visit clubs in the United States, Canada, Newfoundland and Bermuda during his term as president of Rotary International.

### Catholic Church Moves To Dayton

DAYTON, June 14. — "St. Anne's has been chosen as the name for the Catholic church of Dayton, which will soon be brought here from Yerington. A site has been chosen and arrangements for removal are now under way. One hundred twenty-three dollars and fifty cents was raised by a Dayton committee to defray expenses incidental to the removal and erection of the church. — Nevada State Journal.

### Unemployment Compensation

CARSON CITY, June 15. — Initial steps for launching the new unemployment compensation law in Nevada were taken this week with the issuance by the Unemployment Compensation Division in Carson City of the preliminary "Status Report," designated Form NUC-1, to approximately 4,000 Nevada employers.

The "Status Report," a form to determine those employers subject to the law, is a standard-sized sheet in duplicate with a set of instructions for guidance in filling it out, attached. Included are questions concerning the type and size of the individual business, number of workers employed over stipulated periods and questions concerning general payroll data. For employing firms having more than one place of business in the state, a chart is given on the reverse of the form requesting additional necessary data.

Speaking of this report, Wm. Kelly Klaus, division director, said: "It is of the utmost importance that employers to whom these Status Re-

ports are sent, fill them out fully and accurately that the unemployment compensation law may from the beginning operate as efficiently as possible. As noted on the form, these reports must be returned to this office on or before June 25 in order that we may have a record of employers who will be subject to contributions."

The "contributions" referred to by Director Klaus will be called for the first week in July, at which time a "Six Months Contribution Report" will be sent to subject employers, covering the first six months of the present year. The law was passed retroactive to January 1, 1937. The rate for contribution to the Unemployment Compensation Fund is 1.8 per cent of employer's monthly payrolls.

### Association To Improve Stock

Deer will be imported to Clark county and liberated in both the Charleston Park and the Bunkerville area, according to a report made by Percy Nash, of the Clark County Fish and Game Association at the Chamber of Commerce meeting Tuesday.

The only cost will be for transportation of the animals, Mr. Nash stated. The object of the enterprise is to improve the stock of deer now in our mountain areas and afford, in a few years, new hunting grounds for sportsmen.
