Woman Convict Goes To Prison

Mrs. Grace Nusser, convicted by a jury of murder in the first degree for shooting her husband in the back as he slept in his home in Boulder City last April 27, started on her way to the state prison in the prison cage last Tuesday morning.

Mrs. Nusser was wan and shaken after her attempt at suicide by taking sleeping tablets. She had been in a serious condition for several days and, although practically restored to normal health, was low in spirits. The prospect of entering prison to serve a life sentence was apparently not encouraging to high spirits.

Power Question To Commission

The controversy wherein Nevada and California are seeking a reduction in the rates for the sale of Boulder Dam power to the same basis as that applied to the Grand Coulee and other similar projects developing electrical power, has been referred to the Federal Power Commission for study and report on or before January first next.

The proposal of Nevada and California was opposed by the upper basin Colorado river states on the ground that a reduction in rates might reduce the funds available for engineering investigations on the upper portions of the river system. The matter of "compensation in lieu of taxation" which involved the principle of payments from the surplus funds accumulated over and above the costs of amortization of the project, was also involved in the negotiations.
