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Chamber Talks Of Dining Room

Las Vegas Chamber of Commerce at its meeting Tuesday noon, devoted some time to the discussion of the Union Pacific proposal to continue to provide a suitable dining room for banquets and service club luncheons if the community desires.

Mr. Jeffers, head of the Union Pacific, when here several weeks ago, stated that the company is about to build an adequate depot in Las Vegas and that plans for the same do not include any dining room, the company not having any pressing necessity for one since the policy of providing cheap meals on all trains was inaugurated.

It was stated by Mr. Jeffers, however, that if the community as represented by the service clubs and Chamber of Commerce wished the company to continue to provide a suitable dining room, an additional \$50,000 would be added to the investment and the plans, now being made, changed to include a dining room. On the other hand Mr. Jeffers stated that the company has no desire to compete in business with any local interests; that there is no profit to the company in providing the service, and that, only as an accommodation to the people of Las Vegas would a dining room be included in the new building.

E. A. Clark, real estate dealer interested in the operation of the Overland Cafe, expressed opposition to asking the Union Pacific to include a dining room on the ground that it would take \$100,000 per month out of the business channels of the community, to the injury of local business.

O. W. Yates, chairman of the committee appointed to consider the proposal, reported that the committee had discussed the matter but was as yet not ready to make a recommendation.

Bob Russell reported that the Marine room in the basement of Apache Hotel could be secured as a meeting place by the service clubs if desired and that the Junior Chamber of Commerce already held its luncheon meetings there.

C. C. Ronnow expressed the belief that the railroad has for many years performed a valuable public service by providing a suitable dining room for luncheon clubs and banquets. He called attention to the fact that the Chamber members have no desire to see business taken from local restaurants, but that the Chamber and other service clubs had changed their meeting place a number of times in an effort to find
