

Caliente North Highway Is Let

CARSON CITY, Nev., July 13. — The state highway board of directors opened bids and then awarded contract for road construction work in Lincoln county yesterday afternoon.

The contract called for the construction of a portion of the state highway system in Lincoln county from a point approximately one-half a mile north of Caliente to a point approximately one mile north of Panaca Junction, on Route 7, with a length of approximately 14.32 miles. The Silver State Construction Company of Fallon got the job on a low bid of \$23,862.80. Other bidders included: Frederickson and Westbrook of Lower Lake, Cal., \$25,755.60; J. A. Casson, Hayward, Cal., \$27,609.40; Dodge Construction Company of Fallon, \$28,427.00; Oilfields Trucking Company of Bakersfield, Cal., \$31,883.36, and A. S. Vinnell Company, Los Angeles, \$37,298.00.

This work is classified as a Federal Aid Highway Project and will begin within twenty days after formal signing of the contract, and is scheduled for completion within sixty working days. The reemployment office at Pioche will prepare the employment lists for this road-mix project. Material needed for the work consist of 1,022 tons of liquid asphalt of the type SC2, and 94 tons of liquid asphalt of the type MC2, with 14.32 miles of road-mix.

W. R. Parry of the field staff of the highway department has been assigned as resident engineer.

TESTED RECIPE

MARMALADE-FOR-BREAKFAST fans can have marmalade the year 'round without ever tiring—if



they'll slip a little fresh fruit in season in with their oranges and lemons. Right now "marmaladers" who want to follow this scheme ought to be finishing up their

batch of strawberry marmalade and laying in a stock of Raspberry Marmalade
4 cups (2 lbs.) prepared fruit; 7 cups (3 lbs.) sugar; 1 bottle fruit pectin.

To prepare fruit, peel off yellow rind of 2 oranges and 2 lemons with sharp knife, leaving as much of white part on fruit as possible. Put yellow rinds through food chopper; add 1 cup water and 1/2 teaspoon soda, bring to a boil, cover, and simmer 10 minutes. Cut off tight skin of peeled fruit and slip pulp out of each section. Add pulp and juice to cooked rind. Crush or grind about 1 quart fully ripe raspberries; combine with orange mixture.

Measure sugar and prepared fruit into large kettle, filling up last cup with water if necessary. Mix well and bring to a full rolling boil over hottest fire. Stir constantly before and while boiling. Boil gently 5 minutes. Remove from fire and stir in bottled fruit pectin. Then stir and skim by turns for just 5 minutes to cool slightly to prevent floating fruit. Pour quickly Paraffin hot marmalade at once. Makes about 11 glasses (6 fluid ounces each).

Turner To Fly In Bendix Race

Once more aviation's daring pilots and fastest racing planes are being groomed for the annual speed dash across America in the Bendix trophy race. The race will take place on September 3. The official course will be between Los Angeles and Cleveland, with Bendix, N. J., as the official terminus for the transcontinental record. All contestants must check in at Cleveland, site of the National Air Races, on their way to the Atlantic coast.

Each year the Bendix race has brought out faster racing airplanes and the coming event seems destined to develop ships of greater speed than has ever been flown in America before. According to information received by Herbert L. Sharlock, spokesman for Vincent Bendix, a number of entrants will have cruising speeds of well over 300 miles an hour.

"Roscoe Turner will have two ships in the race if no unforeseen

difficulties develop," said Mr. Sharlock in a recent announcement. "One is a new Brown monoplane, which Col. Turner believes will have a top speed in excess of 350 miles per hour. The other is a Wedell-Williams that roars along at well over 275."

Col. Turner will fly the faster of these two ships. It is equipped with a twin-row, 14-cylinder Wasp engine that develops 1,400 horsepower. The other ship will be powered with a 1,000 horsepower Hornet engine. Col. Turner has not announced who will fly his second ship.

The total Bendix trophy purse is \$25,000. The race proper is from Los Angeles to the finish line of the National Air Races in Cleveland, but there is a bonus for the pilot who continues on to New York and shatters Howard Hughes' sensational record. The air distance between Los Angeles and Bendix, N. J., on a great circle course is 2,446 miles.

The 1936 winner of the Bendix Trophy was Mrs. Louise Thaden.
