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Bank of America Joint Meeting **Buys First State**

Papers were signed last Wednesday evening whereby the Bank of Kiwanis Club, and Leo A. McNamee, America agrees to purchase a controlling interest in the stock of ly at the meeting of the two clubs First State Bank of Las Vegas.

The deal comes as the result of negotiations which were instituted some months ago. The Banki of America, through its subsidiary, First National Bank of Reno, long ago decided to enter the Las Vegas field in order to participate in the which Boulder Dam power insures for this section, and announced its intention of establishing here a branch of its Reno subsidiary. Howcontrolling the more than three million dollars in deposits of the First State Bank, and desiring to enjoy the high regard in which President Ed Clark, Cashier C. S. Wengert, and other officers and employees of the local bank are held, the Bank of America naturally preferred to purchase the local bank if possible.

In pursuance of this policy, G. M. McClerkin of San Francisco, came to Las Vegas and succeeded in making the deal for purchase of the bank.

Part of the agreement provides that the present personnel of First State Bank shall continue to carry on the business. Ed Cark will remain at the head of the organization but will be relieved of the tremendous load of responsibility which has been laid upon him. Mr. Wengert will remain as cashier, and the other personnel of the bank will remain unchanged, with the possible exception that a representative of the Bank of America interests will be placed in a key position to promote the policies of the parent institution.

The completion of the deal and transfer of the controlling interest to the new concern will require about 30 days, it is believed.

While many Las Vegas residents feel some regret at the passing of the great institution which the First State Bank has grown to be, it is generally recognized that it is better for the community to continue to have one strong institution to serve it instead of dividing its business between two.

It is believed also that the advent of the Bank of America interests into Las Vegas will give the people of Southern Nevada access to a vast reservoir of capital which will be needed within the next few years for the development of this region through use of Boulder Dam power.

Westside Plans Hears Debates For Celebration

Westside will on Friday evening, August 6, celebrate the completion of the great underpass structure which conveys Clark avenue under the Union Pacific tracks and removes the barrier which, for more than thirty years, has separated Westside from Las Vegas proper.

The completion of the structure removes the danger to school children, obliged to cross the railroad tracks to the high school, and to the hundreds of automobies which daily pass between Las Vegtas and Westside.

The structure, erected through cooperation between the Nevada State Highway department and the Federal Bureau of Public Roads, is fine architecturally and an ornament to any city. Its cost approximates \$175,000, and it is the most expensive structure of its kind in the state of Nevada, perhaps in the west.

C. D. Baker, chairman, Roger Foley and C. P. Squires, who constitute the Chamber of Commerce committee promoting the celebration, are working in cooperation with C. V. T. Gilbert, Jerry Wolfe, August Berning and a group of Westside residents in arranging a notable celebration between the hours of seven and eight o'clock next Friday evening. Invitations have been extended to Governor Kirman, Robert A. Allen, head of the state highway depar ment, and other members of the board, and Lieut.-Gov. Fred S. Alward.

Mayor Arnett and the board of city commissioners; the county commissioners; Brown, engineer of the Federal Bureau of Good Roads; officials of the Union Pacific railroad, and other prominent citizens have been invited to participate.
