Will Celebrate **Boulder Power**


Pioche will hold a great celebration September 6, 7 and 8, when it will combine its Labor Day activities with a commemoration of completion of the \$900,000 Lincoln county power transmission line which will carry electrical power from Boulder dam t oPioche and various other locations in Lincoln county, thus making it possible for that rich mineral region to enter upon the greatest prosperity it has known.

According to The Pioche Record, the celebration this year will set a mark for Pioche to shoot at for years to come. It says, in its issue of July 22, among other things:

"Many personalities of prominence will be with us during the celebration and already reservations have been made with the Union Pacific R. R. Co. to furnish several Pullman cars to help take care of visitors who come here to celebrate with us.

"Many of the machine companies and almost every one of the mines in the district have pledged themselves liberally inancially and laborers are planning on donating one day's pay in order to guarantee a real success.

"Joe Listion is lining up fighters



for the occasion and needless to say Joe will see to it that there will be plenty of action in that part of the program.

"Baseball nines are working out strenuously and soon some will be cut out by the elimination process. The best will remain and play on Labor Day.

"The local Golf Club is extending invitations to other clubs throughout the state to attend a tournament to be played during all three days of the celebration. Liberal prizes will be awarded and it is expected that mnay teams wil be entered.

"The Rodeo committee is investi gating rodeo outfits and will perhaps make an announcement on heir plans in the near future.

"The advertising committee has stickers out so call and get one to put on your car. Letterheads and envelopes advertising the big event are being sent out by almost every mine and merchant in the district and should have their effect in bringing in the crowd.

Accept Bids For Two Power Units

More power for Boulder Dam was assured when Secretary Harold L. Ickes awarded contracts totaling \$1.984,634.50 for electrical equipment to be used in two additional generating units for the giant power house at the toe o' the dam in Black Canyon of the Colorado river.

When these two units are completed and installed, the power house at Boulder Dam will reach half its full generating capacity of 1,835,000 horse power. With half the units operating, Boulder Dam will be larger than any existing hydroelectric plants in the world.

The major equipment covered by today's contracts included two 115,-000 horse power turbines, but a pair of governors, 3 oil circuit breakers, 11 disconnecting switches, 7 transformers and a Peterson coil also were included.

> The Hanging Gardens of Babylon, destroyed in 484 B. C., more than 100 years before they were listed among the wonders.


> The Temple of Diana at Ephesus, burned in 262 A. D.
