## Kingman To Get Boulder Power

The following press dispatch from Washington, D. C., is the culmination of efforts that have been put forth the past several months by the Citizens Utilities Company of Kingman for the acquiring of power from Boulder dam for distribution through its central plant here, says The Mohave County Miner.

Engineering work was commenced on this project sometime ago and other requirements needed for the location and rights of way, have been diligently followed up by the local company. The favorable decision of the interior department as given in the press dispatch is just one of the steps toward acquiring

electrical power from Boulder dam for the use of the company's patrons in Mohave county.

"Washington, July 22. — The Interior Department solicitor ruled today that, should Arizona sign a contract for purchase of Boulder dam power, that state 'would be subject to the provisions' of the Colorado river compact 'for the duration of the power contract.'

"Execution of the contract would not, however, the solicitor added, 'constitute a ratification' of the compact by Arizona.

"The solicitor's ruling, filed with Secretary Ickes, cleared up several points raised by a request from the Citizens' Utilities Company for permission to buy 5,000 kilowatts of power for distribution in the vicinity of Kingman, Ariz.

"The solicitor held also that power used in Arizona by the Citizens' Utilities Company or other corporation or individual 'need not be part of the allotment of firm energy to the state of Arizona.'

"Secondary energy which is not used by the Metropolitan Water District or the lessees (Los Angeles and the Southern California Edison Company) and unused firm energy allocated to the district which is not taken by the lessees, may be disposed of to the Citizens Utilities Company for use in the state of Arizona and would not constitute part of the allotment of firm energy to the state of Arizona."

## Training Camp Improves Boys

C.M.T.C. HEADQUARTERS, Fort Douglas, Utah, July 29. — Fortified by a month of hearty eating, outdoor activity and plenty of sleep, more than 200 trainees from this camp will return to their homes in our western states this week healthier and heavier than when they arrived July 1.

Examinations made by army physicians at the post indicate the young men are putting on an average of more than four pounds in weight and expanding their chest measurements since they checked in at the start of the training period.

These physical examinations are part of a well-planned health program at the camp.

Only boys in good physical condition were allowed to enroll for the month long period of military training, but, "just in case," a physician is on constant duty at the camp, and "sick call" is sounded each morning and afternoon.

One of the trainees—Runyan Van Iorns of Logan, Utah—underwent an appendicitis operation at the post hospital, but other than that there has been nothing of major nature.

Credit for the improvement in weight goes to the mess sergeant

and his cooks, and the camp regulation calling for "lights out" at 9:00 p. m.

The trainees have not only been fed three hearty meals daily—with no limit on the number of helpings—but have also received a half pint of milk at 10:00 a. m. each day to break the period between breakfast and luncheon.

As a sample of the menu, here is what was served up to the more than 200 trainees from Utah, Nevada, Idaho and western Wyoming one day after a morning of drill and preparatory to an afternoon of athletics:

One hundred twenty pounds of creamed chicken omelette, 60 pounds of tomatoes, 40 pounds of spinach and 60 gallons of lemonade, rounded out with 100 pounds of potatoes, 30 gallons of chocolate pudding, 50 pounds of bread and 10 pounds of butter.

"The young men in this year's C. M.T.C. battalion were in good physical condition when they arrived, or we would have added more than four pounds to their weight," said Brigadier General Walter C. Sweeney, camp commander.

The trainees will demobilize July 30, following Visitors' Day, July 29.
