TESTED RECIPE

SOME cottages may be tumble-down and neglected, but I know of other cottages which are trim and charming. And that goes for Cottage Puddings as well!



I've eaten cottage puddings which were carelessly made—and the less said about them, the better. Then I've

eaten cottage puddings which were little poems. This is one. The rich goodness of chocolate contributes in no small degree to this happy result.

Chocolate Cottage Pudding

1 1/4 cups sifted cake flour; 1 1/2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder; 1/2 teaspoon salt; 4 tablespoons butter or other shortening; 1 cup sugar; 2 egg yolks, well beaten; 1 1/2 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted; 1/4 teaspoon vanilla; 1/2 cup milk; 2 egg whites, stiffly beaten.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Cream butter thoroughly, add sugar gradually and cream well. Add egg yolks and beat thoroughly; then chocolate and vanilla. Add flour, alternately with milk, beating after each addition until smooth. Fold in egg whites. Turn into greased pan, 8x8x2-inches. Bake in moderate oven (325° F.) 50 minutes, or until done. Remove from pan. Serve warm or cold with plain or whipped cream. Serves 12.
