#### Congressmen On Game Protection Plan Labor Day Plan Advanced

Mr. W. M. Rush, regional director of the United States Biological Society, Region One, with offices in Portland, states that the plan, recently approved by Secretary Wallace, to obtain greater participation of state game officials in matters affecting migratory bird protection is going to be of great benefit to the states, as well as the Biological Survey, in legislative matters.

According to the plan, advanced by Ira N. Gabrielson, chief of the United States biological survey, and already endorsed by a majority of the state commissions, representatives of the states will meet annually with federal wild-life officials to discuss conditions affecting migratory game birds and their pursuit by hunters.

The state leaders probably will meet with members of the biological survey early in summer, following a similar conferece with the bureau of fisheries. Throughout the year and preceding conferences, the biological survey plans to forward to the state officials data collected by bureau naturalists and information on problems as they arise. Regional meetings at various times will also permit further consultaion between the state and federal wild-life workers.
