Power Courses

Electric power began to surge its way through the new \$900,000 line just completed to transmit electricty from Boulder Dam to Pioche and various places adjacent to the line.

Preparations were made by Electrical Engineer Charles Thompson with the utmost caution Wednesday to switch the power being generated by the A-8 generator in the Arizona wing of Boulder Dam power house from the lines of the Nevada-California Power Company to the new Pioche transmission lines.

The Nevada-California Power Company's line was built at a cost of about \$2,500,000 as one of the first necessities for construction of Boulder Dam and was used to transmit power from California to the dam and to Bou'der City. However, since there has been power available from the great generators at the dam, the old line has been utilized to transmit power back to the power centers in southern California.

Then, Wednesday, the power going to California over the old line was switched off, its place being taken in southern California by the steam turbine plant at Seal Beach. And the power whch formerly went to California over this line became available for the Pioche line.

Therefore, Mr. Thompson, the engineer under whose supervision the Pioche line was constructed, waited in the Nevada-California power station from noon until three o'clock Wednesday for word from the far end of the line that everything was ready and that workmen were free of the line. Then the hot "juice" from the Boulder Dam generator
