

Sky Queen Tells Of TWA Journey

Miss Mazie Martin, chosen from a group of charming young ladies to represent Las Vegas as "Sky Queen" for the TWA on its first regular flight from this city to San Francisco, was naturally both pleased and delighted to be so favored.

"I want to thank the people of Las Vegas for the wonderful send-off they gave to me as TWA Sky Queen. I owe to them and to the great TWA organization whose new route I had the privilege of helping to dedicate one of the most delightful experiences of my life and one which I shall never forget," said Miss Martin.

"I wish every person in Las Vegas might have had the same experience. It was a wonderful trip from start to finish. So much was crowded into a few hours I can hardly recall everything.

"We left Vegas airport, circled over the city and struck out in a bee line for the coast, going over Charleston Mountains a little south of the peak. Before we realized it we were flying over the lower portion of Death Valley. I had expected it would be hot there, but as we were flying at an altitude of 10,000 feet it was quite pleasant. We passed south of Mount Whitney, the highest peak in the United States, flew over Sequoia National forest and Yosemite Valley and alnded at Fresno, where another Sky Queen representing that city helped in the christening and joined our party. We were there only about ten minutes.

"A fine dinner was served after we left Fresno, and before we knew it we were over San Francisco Bay framed in the thousands of lights of the Bay cities. It made a wonderful and beautiful picture.

"Because of the many ceremonies enroute the plane was a little late reaching the San Francisco airport. There we were met by a group of officials of TWA and a crowd of people who came to meet the plane. Among the officials were President Jack Frye and Vice-President John B. Walker, and they presented us with high bouquets of roses.

"Autos took us to the lovely Mark Hopkins hotel in San Francisco, located on the hill overlooking the city. After resting and changing our dresses, we were taken for dinner to one of San Francisco's famous night spots, "John's Rendezvous." The dinner was perfect and we spent some time dining and dancing and enjoying the floor show. Of course there as at other places we went, we were the recipients of many pleasant attentions. In fact we were royally entertained from the time we arrived until we left San Francisco.

"Later in the evening we were taken on a tour of Chinatown and other interesting places, all so exciting that I can hardly describe them. One place was the Coit tower on Telegraph hill, where we had a marvelous view of the city by night.

"After that we went to the Plantation, another of San Francisco's gay places, where we danced a while, then back to the hotel for some rest before the excitement of San Francisco by daylight. I want to say the Mark Hopkins is a beautiful hotel and they treated us royally.

"We were supposed to leave for home Monday morning, but the TWA officials arranged to have us stay over another day. So, after a rather quiet day resting, we had dinner that night in Chinatown and finished the evening in the Parisian ball room at the Sir Francis Drake, another of San Francisco's beautiful hotels.

"Tuesday morning we left in the plane at 7:00 and were back at Las Vegas airport at 10:05, a little ahead of schedule, only slightly more than three hours from San Francisco, which seems to me like a miracle.

"When I knew I was to take this trip I at first feared I might be ill or frightened. However, after starting I found I could travel in one of these mighty TWA ships in perfect comfort and with a sense of perfect safety. I hope to make the trip many times again."
