

C. V. T. Gilbert, at the meeting of Las Vegas Rotary Club Thursday noon, described a remarkable specimen of ancient Indian picture writings which he found in a remote place 83 miles up Lake Mead on a ridge between the "Garden of the Gods" and the lake.

The specimen is one of the few that are found detached from the original position high up on the wall of the canyon and had fallen about 550 feet without serious damage to the picture writings.

In size the rock is about eight feet tall, four to four and one-half feet wide, and probably five feet thick, and is estimated to weigh 18 tons.

Thomas Wolfe, vice-president and traffic manager of Western Air Express, was a guest and speaker at Tuesday's meeting of Las Vegas Chamber of Commerce.

He discussed several interesting developments which he declared are in the making and which may have a very great effect upon Las Vegas as a center of air travel, and which ultimately may lead to creating International air routes through this city.

He declared that Western Air is spending forty thousand dollars a year to publicize their air service and every piece of literature mentions Las Vegas.


