## Carpenter Head Of Mine School

Succeeding John A. Fulton, who yesterday was granted a year's leave of absence by the University of Nevada board of regents, Professor J. A. Carpenter Wednesday will assume the position of director of the Mackay School of Mines, says Nevada State Journal.

Fulton was granted a leave of absence extending from September 15 of this year to September 15, 1938. During the period, he will be engaged in developmental work on his own properties and as a mining consultant. Fulton, who graduated from the university in 1898, has been director of the school of mines since 1924.

Professor Carpenter graduated from the University of Nevada with a degree of bachelor of science in 1907, and in 1911 was awarded the degree of engineer of mines. After being connected with the university as an instructor and assistant professor in mining he engaged in mining at Tonopah, and from 1921 to 1926 was professor of mining at the South Dakota mining school. He joined the Nevada faculty in 1926.
