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LEGION REASSURING

Comforting and reassuring are the declarations made by the great convention of the American Legion at New York.

As the only insurance of peace the convention declared that the United States must have the largest and most powerful navy in the world and a standing army of 180,000 men.

It also denounced Communism, Fascism and Naziism, and urged national legislation "that will punish American citizens who advocate the overthrow of our government by force, fraud or violence, and deport all aliens who so advocate such overthrow.

THE PRESIDENT MUST ANSWER

Westward the President of the United States has started on a double mission. He is girded as a missionary for his social ideas. He is putting an ear to the ground, to see whence come the growing rumbles of discontent with his administration.

Primarily, to judge from the intimations in his Constitution Day address, he will be campaigning for what he still does not believe to be a lost cause, the packing of the Supreme Court. The Black scandal is a gadfly that may complicate this. But essentially the trip will be to press home the ideas that the President refuses to believe already are discredited. He proposes to be the evangelist of the New Deal.

Yet he must reckon with something more. He must and will be questioned. No longer can his soothing tones cloak vital issues. No longer can evasions conceal underlying issues crying for solution.

What, for instance, they are asking, is the President going to do about Mr. Justice Black, a life member of the Ku Klux Klan, appointed hastily and without investigation, who has hidden himself like a spanked child and refused to talk?

Is there going to be a special session of Congress? If so, why?

Why, with industry at a high level and the necessity for relief so far decreased that one major relief agency has been abandoned is the cost of Federal government soaring to an all-time peace peak of \$10,000,000,000?

Is the farm policy of crop destruction to continue as the prices of foodstuff and meat soar?

Will the President defy American custom and seek a third term?

These are plain questions that anybody can understand. All the people are asking them.

Vegas Catholics Raise Large Sum

The Reno Diocesan Fund was swelled to \$13,450 at Las Vegas on Tuesday evening when 100 men meeting at a dinner conference in



honor of Bishop Thomas E. Gorman, D. D., subscribed \$6,650 in preliminary gifts for a Diocesan Extension Program.

A large delegation of Boulder City men joined in the affair and much enthusiasm was manifested.

Previously, on Sunday last at Elko, 125 men had similarly pledged themselves to \$6,800.00 in support of the movement which is state-wide in scope.

It is announced that 400 men were expected to attend the final dinner - conference scheduled for the Elks' Club in Reno on Sunday next under the chairmanship of United States Atorney E. P. Carville. On that occasion Bishop Gorman will outline a twelve-point program to the men assembled, covering the fields of religion, charity and educa ion.

Following the Reno dinner on Sunday, a series of six mass meetings for the 600 campaign workers will be held beginning at Winnemucca on Monday, September 27, Elko on September 28, Ely on September 29, Las Vegas on September 30, Tonopah on October 1, and concluding with a mass meeting in Reno on Sunday, October 2.

A diocesan radio hour is also announced for Sunday, October 3, from Station KOH in Reno.

A general canvass of the 12,400 atholics comprising the Diocese of Reno will be made by the 600 campaign workers throughout Nevada beginning on Monday, October 4.

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
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
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
