

"Ghost Casino" For Rhyolite

Rhyolite's famous depot, once the scene of feverish activity as miners poured into and out of the gold camp shortly after the turn of the century, will take on new life on October 1, N. Westmoreland, new owner of the famous building revealed in Tonopah today.

On October 1, Westmoreland stated, his new casino will be thrown open to the public and southern Nye county's newest business venture will become a reality. Keeping the tradition of the camp intact, Westmoreland announced that he has renamed the depot the "Ghost Casino."

According to Westmoreland, he has expended more than \$10,000 in refinishing and redecorating the building and expects to spend several thousand more before the first of the month. A new electric light plant, a modern bar, club room and other fixtures have been installed.

Slightly more than ten miles from the California boundary, the casino is expected to attract scores of Death Valley tourists into Nevada. Westmoreland, who is spending a few days in Tonopah, said. He is accompanied by Dick Bell of Ash Meadows and Miss Holmes.—Tonopah Times.

The Wolves Frolic will be changed from October 22 to October 21, Thursday night; and that of the bonfire rally from October 21 to October 22, Friday night.

Alumni who are planning to come to Reno on Friday in time for the Wolves' Frolic will now have to change their plans and come on Thursday if they wish to attend the Frolic.

The change was made, according to Finance Control, to inspire more enthusiasm and spirit into the students and the team members by having the rally the night before the game with the College of Pacific.

In past years there has been more or less of a let down between the rally on Thursday night and the game on Saturday afternoon. To avoid the recurrence of this again, it was decided by the Control to change the Frolic and rally dates for this year, at least. If any improvement is shown then in the support of the football game on Saturday afternoon, October 23, the plan will be continued in the future.

This year freshmen are required to gather five boxes and two automobile tires and the girls five boxes instead of the minimum five boxes of last year. In view of the fact that there are 535 Freshmen on the campus, this should be the biggest bonfire in the history of the Homecoming Day celebrations. A NEW member of the All-American team of hot dogs, pancakes and Flivvers is iced tea.

It has come to play a role in this country that beer does in Germany, coffee in Turkey, and cocoanut juice in the South Sea Islands. Whether it's gulped with gusto over lunch counters or sipped at leisure in exclusive clubs, it is still the Star Spangled Banner's answer to hot thermometers.

The American motorist carries it in his trusty thermos. Congressmen serve it to constituents. Housewives list it as a summer necessity. It's part of every picnic program and the high point of village socials. To the tinkle of its ice, Mrs. Jones tells "all" to Mrs. Smith. It's Jimmy's reward for eating his carrots and the policeman's excuse for visiting the cook. It's as inseparable from summer menus as mint from Juleps.

Like potatoes, it lends itself to a variety of recipes. First of all—just plain iced tea. You prepare your brew by first boiling the water, pouring this over the tea leaves—two teaspoons to a glass instead of the one as to a cup, allowing for the dilution by the ice. Allow it to steep for three to five minutes. Strain, and put aside to cool. When you're ready to serve it—fill glass with ice, pour in the tea, add sugar to taste, and serve with slices of lemon. A nice extra touch is a sprig of mint.

Here are recipes for two new variations.

Orange Blossom Tea Punch

One cup sugar syrup, 2 cups freshly brewed tea, 6 cups orange carbonated beverage, 1 sliced orange. Add sugar syrup to tea and pour over ice. Add orange beverage and garnish with orange slices. Makes 2 quarts.

Cherry Ginger Tea Punch

One cup sugar syrup, 2 cups cherry juice, canned, 2 cups freshly brewed tea, 1 quart gingerale. Add sugar syrup to cherry juice. Pour tea over ice. Stir in cherry mixture and add gingerale. Makes 2 quarts.
