Doug Describes Football Team

UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA, Reno, Sept. 22. — Coach Doug Dashiell presents his average University of Nevada football player:

If he is a lineman he will bend the scales at 182 pounds. If he is a backfield man he will tip them at 167 pounds.

The highest man on the squad is Ray McMichael, from Las Vegas, Nev., who weighs only 130 pounds. Ray plays quarterback and has plenty of pep. At the other extreme is Charles McIntyre burley 220-pound transfer from Ventura, J. C., playing his first year for the Wolves. McIntyre is a top-notch place kicker, as well as a punter of good ability, and probably will see of action at the pivot position.

The shortest player is "Wee Willie" Dale, a five-foot six-inch half-back who hails from Culver City, Calif., and is playing his second year or Nevada. He is a miniautre in comparison of "Big JoJhn" Radoovich, Hollis McKinnon, and Guy Guy Brown who willowed up to six foot four inches.

Players have come from all over the country to be members of the Silver and Blue "Bombers". California has contributed 17 of the 53 men, and 25 are "home owned," hailing from all over the state of Nevada. The rest of the boys are scattered from the mid-west: Kansas, North Dakota, Nebraska and South Dakota.

From the statistics of last year, the Wolves were superior to their opponents in every class, except yards played and aerial style of ball. Nevada tripled its opponents' yardage in the passing department, and completed twice as many attempted passes.
