Mr. Jeffers, born January 2, 1876, at North Platte, Nebraska began his railroad career with the Union Pa cific in June 1090 as call boy. He rose with that company successfully as clerk, timekeeper, steel gang foreman, telegrapher, train distpatcher, chief dispatcher, superintenden, general superitrendent, general manager operating vice president, executive vice-president and now president.

Born at Princeton, Arkansas, Mr. Gray attended the preparation department of the University of Arkansas and entered railway service as telegrapher for the St. Louis & San Francisco in 1883 and was successively station agent, commercial agent, division freight agent, division superintendent, superin endent of transportation, general manager, operating vice-president, and senior vice-president. In 1911 he became president of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railroad and in 1912, president of the Great Northern railway.

From January, 1918, to January, 1919, he was director of transportation and later director of operation of railways under federal control, and on January 1, 1920, he became president of the Union Pacific. He has been a director of the Association of American Railroads and of the Railway Express Agency since organization, and for five years was director of the United States Chamber of Commerce.
