

Election Call At Logandale

L. R. Brooks, regional grazer, has issued notice that an election will be held October 16, 1937, between the hours of 2 and 5 p. m. at the school house at Logandale, Nevada.

The object of the election is to fill vacancies occurring as a result of the expiration of the terms of one-third of the District Advisors or Nevada Grazing District No. 5, which was established under the Act of June 26, 1936, commonly known as the Taylor Grazing Act.

Nominations and other election preliminaries will begin at 1:00 o'clock the day of election.

To assist the Director of Grazing in the performance of his duties, there are authorized to be advisors of local stockmen in each district. District Advisors must possess the qualifications of a qualified applicant for a grazing license within the district. Persons offering to vote for a District Advisor subsequent to the first election in a district must possess the qualifications in said district.

An applicant for a grazing license is qualified if he owns livestock and is:

1. A citizen of the United States or one who has filed his declaration of intention to become such, or
2. A group, association, or corporation authorized to conduct busi-

The SNAPSHOT GUILD ANIMAL AND PET PICTURES



The very fact that animals and pets don't pose makes them ideal photographic subjects.

FROM household pets to giants of the jungles—animals are ideal subjects for photographers. They don't pose; they don't act. You can snap them in natural, undirected action and that is just the reason their pictures create so much interest.

To get good pictures of any animal the first essential is patience. It is quite possible that the family dog will stand up obligingly for you on command, but in picturing all other animals you'll find it necessary to wait for the picture you want.

And this brings us to the question—what do you want in an animal picture?

You may prefer to snap a kitten as it plays with a string or a dog wrestling with a stick.

Domestic animals, of course, offer few real camera difficulties, for you can get them to come where the light is right. Open shade, on a bright day, will be found best. As for shutter speed (if your camera

has variable speeds), you'll need 1/25th of a second or faster, to catch fleeting poses and expressions. Unless the light is exceptional, better work with the lens wide open.

To snap less controllable animals—squirrels, birds, and such—you'll need greater patience and cunning. Much depends on background and on your distance from the subject. At more than ten feet, for example, a squirrel becomes almost invisible UNLESS it is sharply revealed on a branch, with the sky for background. Obviously, you'll need to use a fast shutter; squirrels move too swiftly for slow snaps.

The zoo can be a happy hunting ground, too. In many cases, you'll be able to shoot through or over the bars of cages, obtaining clear, unobstructed snaps.

Use a modern, color sensitive film. You'll need all the detail you can get and the utmost in color value rendering.

ness under the laws of the state in which the grazing district is located.

In addition to the above qualifications, a qualified applicant or voter must also have:

- a. Dependent commensurate property with priority of use, or
- b. Dependent commensurate property without priority, or
- c. Priority of use alone, or
- d. He may be a free use applicant having dependent commensurate property and owning 10 head or less of livestock kept for domestic purposes. A free use applicant

may vote only for a free use candidate.

A candidate may be nominated by any qualified voter of the district. He must have dependent commensurate property or prior use within the precinct he is to represent. He must be a representative of the class of stock owners to which he belongs—a cattle man only can represent cattle, and a sheep man, sheep.

A voter may vote only for the candidate representing the same class of livestock as the voter owns, either cattle, sheep, or free use. If

he operates more than one class he may elect with which class he will vote. He may vote for one candidate from each precinct in which a vacancy occurs, where the vacancy represents his class of livestock.

Voting will be done by written ballot. No proxies will be allowed.

Names of District Advisors whose terms expire at this time will be decided by lot on the date of election.
