TESTED RECIPE

ARE you looking for something different, something unusual in desserts, with a high percentage chance of pleasing every one? Coconut Snow Pudding is my nomination for the recipe to fill your need. Served in frozen, coconut-flecked cubes topped with lemon sauce, this nourishing dessert has everything needed to win favor whenever it is served.



Coconut Snow Pudding

1 tablespoon granulated gelatin; ¼ cup cold water; 1 cup boiling water; 1 cup sugar; ¼ teaspoon salt; 1½ teaspoons vanilla, ¾ cup shredded coconut; 2 egg whites, stiffly beaten.

Soak gelatin in cold water 5 minutes, add boiling water, and stir until dissolved. Add sugar, salt, and vanilla. Chill until cold and syrupy. Place in bowl of cracked ice or ice water and whip with rotary egg beater until fluffy and thick like whipped cream. Fold in coconut and egg whites. Turn into shallow pan, 8x8 inches. Chill until firm. Cut in 1-inch cubes. Pile cubes in sherbet glasses. Serve with Parfait Lemon Sauce. Serves 10.

Parfait Lemon Sauce

2 egg yolks; 3 tablespoons lemon juice; ½ cup sugar; dash of salt; 1 teaspoon lemon rind; ½ cup cream, whipped.

Combine egg yolks, lemon juice, sugar, and salt in top of double boiler, mixing thoroughly. Beat with rotary egg beater. Place over rapidly boiling water and cook 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from boiling water; add lemon rind. Chill. Fold in whipped cream. Makes 1½ cups sauce.

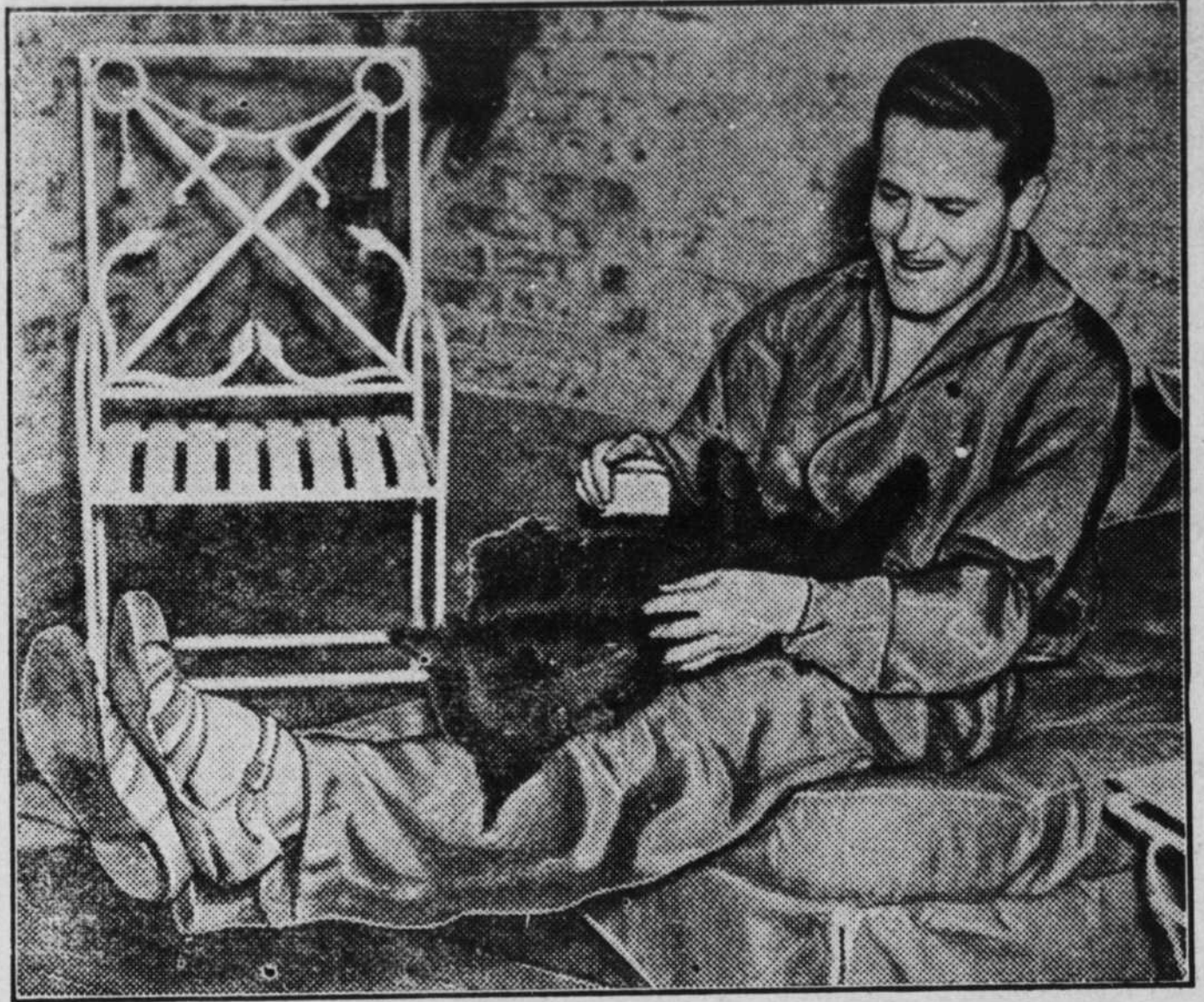
TREHEARNES HERE

To keep scatter rugs from slipping sew old rubber jar rings in each corner on the underneath side.

These are some of the latest household hints gathered by Allen Prescott, radio star, known to listeners as the "Wife Saver," who will discuss the subject when guest

speaking on Columbia's "Heinz Magazine of the Air," Oct. 6th.

"When cleaning the oil mop," advises Prescott, "remember to dip it into boiling water into which you have tossed some soap flakes instead of shaking it out of the window. Add a little ammonia to the last rinse water."

"If you have trouble finding your electric push buttons in the dark, why not add to the comforts of the home by touching them up with luminous paint. This saves time, bumps and displays of temper."

"Another sure way of saving your furniture," added Prescott, "is to provide a board, plenty of nails and a hammer, when your youngsters feel the urge to hammer."

IF YOUR HOUSE CATCHES FIRE

If your house catches fire—keep your head. Follow a simple but vital routine and your chance of escaping safely will be tremendously increased. Succumb to panic and thoughtless activity and your next stop may be the hospital or the morgue.

Writing in McCall's, John J. McElligott, New York fire chief, points out that two-thirds of our annual fire deaths occur in dwellings mainly because the occupants don't know how to get out. And three-fourths of these victims are trapped on top floors, because they fail to recognize the danger signals of heat and pressure on bedroom doors.

The first thing the householder should do if awakened by fire, is to feel the bedroom door panel. If

the wood is hot, don't open the door unless you want to sign your death warrant. If there is an exit via a window or roof, take it. If not, stay in the room with the door closed and call for help.

If the door is relatively cool, open it an inch, with your body braced against it so it can be instantly slammed if a rush of hot air follows the opening. If the heat outside is bearable, move with the utmost speed. Don't try to save belongings. Fire travels a thousand times faster than the uninitiated realize. A stairway that is passable one minute, may be a roaring inferno the next. And once you're outside—stay out! Many a life has been lost because someone rushed back inside a burning building.

Chief McElligott recommends that every family held periodic fire drills, especially if there are children. The experience these drills provide may be a life-saver if fire eventually breaks out—a mind and body trained in the technique of escaping a burning building, are not so susceptible to the deadly delay and panic.
