

Dashiell Wolves Run Over Chico

CHICO, Cal., Oct. 16.—A spectacular razzle dazzle attack spoiled Chico's Homecoming day as Nevada's Blue Bombers ran wild, emerging on the long end of a 27-0 score.

After a scoreless first period, marked by many fumbles and ragged playing, the Wolves came to life. They scored two touchdowns in the second period and one each in the third and fourth.

Taking the ball in the first play of the second quarter, Captain Bill Grubbs, pile-driving fullback, plowed through the entire Wildcat team for the initial score. Pat Aaton, who spent most of the time on the sidelines with an injured ankle, came in and converted with Jim Twombly holding the ball.

A few minutes later, Quarterback John Robb threw a 20-yard pass to "Socking Sam" Basa, lanky end, who rambled the remaining 15 yards for the second Nevada score. Noel Bennett kicked the extra point.

Nevada's most spectacular play came in the third period when a 10-yard pass from Robb to Kenny Powell was lateralled five times before McIntyre carried the ball over.

Starting on the Nevada 45, the play went from Robb to Powell who

shot it back to Grubbs. From then on the swiftness of the play made it impossible to keep track of the players. Keivit, who played an outstanding game at tackle for the Wolves, wound up with the ball, and he lateralled to McIntyre, Pack center who went over the goal line.

McIntyre also converted for the extra point making the score 21-0 in favor of the Wolves.

Ray McMichael, diminutive quarterback, set the stage for the final Nevada score. McMichael came into the game, and on the first play broke away over left end for 50 yards, being brought down from behind on the Chico five. Powell carried the ball over from the 7-yard line after two plays had been wasted. Eaton who came in to try for the extra point, had his kick blocked by Captain Delgado of Chico.

Chico never seriously threatened at any time during the game, never penetrating beyond the Pack 15-yard line.

A second-quarter goal-line stand by Chico in the second period was one of the highlights of the game. The 'Cats held for four downs, with the ball on the one-yard line.

Coach Dashiell used almost every man that was able to play. Joe Kelvet, who played most of the game at tackle, was one outstanding Nevada player. John "Ham" Robb, after a listless first quarter, settled down and played good ball.

An attempted field goal in the third quarter by McIntyre was blocked by Captain Delgado, tackle, who was the outstanding man on the field for Chico.

Nevada's aerial attack kept the crowd in an uproar. In the last three quarters, almost every play ended in a lateral of some sort. No laterals were intercepted.

The whole Nevada team showed a marked improvement over previous games this year.

Bonfire Heap Well Guarded

Firebugs, beware!

University of Nevada homecoming bonfire committee issued that warning yesterday.

Tony Yriberry, Louis Peraldo and Lawrence Strong, committeemen, are protecting the big pile of boxes and tires, against the fire-setter who has been applying the torch in Reno recently.

They have appointed a night patrol to guard the heap every night between 7:30 and 11 p. m. The guards are selected from candidates for the sagers, university work organization.

Tires and boxes were collected by freshmen. Upper classmen ordered each man to bring five boxes and three tires, and each woman five boxes, with a threat of punishment if the bonfire essentials are not produced.

"Due to the larger frosh class this year and the good support we have been getting from certain students, this year's bonfire should be the biggest in the history of the university," Yriberry said last night.

Two freshmen students—Ralston Hawkins and Arling Roberson—are vying for the credit of gathering the largest number of boxes and tires.

At the present time, Hawkins has a total of 152 large boxes to his credit, and Roberson has collected more than a hundred tires.

Hawkins holds the title of gathering the largest amount of fire stuff since the beginning of the bonfire tradition.

The bonfire, which will be held Friday night on the hill adjoining Mackey field, will start off the pre-game rally of the Nevada-College of the Pacific football contest—Nevada State Journal.

Bobcats Mangle Vegas Wildcats

In the Nevada season's biggest upset, White Pine's Bobcats beat the mighty Las Vegas Wildcats here today by a single point.

The score was 7 to 6. Sutich's conversion after touchdown proved the margin which gave the local team their thrilling upset. The Vegas scoring machine had been highly favored to win, and went into the game with a big weight advantage.

Two Las Vegas scoring drives were stalled off by the hard fighting local team in the first half, and another was stopped in the closing moments.

White Pine kept the southerners back on their heels during most of the first half with a surprise rushing defense which bogged down most of the famed Vegas reverses and laterals.

In the second quarter Adam passed to Popoff. "The Mad Russian," who was finally downed on the Wildcats' 2-yard line. From this point Smith smacked the center of the Vegas line for a touchdown, and Sutich made good the extra point.

"The Mad Russian" led a sterling defense in the second half in which

the Ely team held off the invaders' drives. Smith and Asworth were outstanding in blocking and tackling on the local squad.

In the last quarter, with but four minutes remaining, Montgomery led a Las Vegas drive down the field on a series of laterals and spinners. Wells took the ball on the Ely 22-yard line and skirted right end for a touchdown. Hase broke through Vegas blockers and smothered the attempted placekick before the ball left the kicker's toe.

In the closing minutes the Bobcats smeared desperate Las Vegas players behind the line, and the game ended as Hase recovered a Wildcat fumble on the Ely 40-yard line.

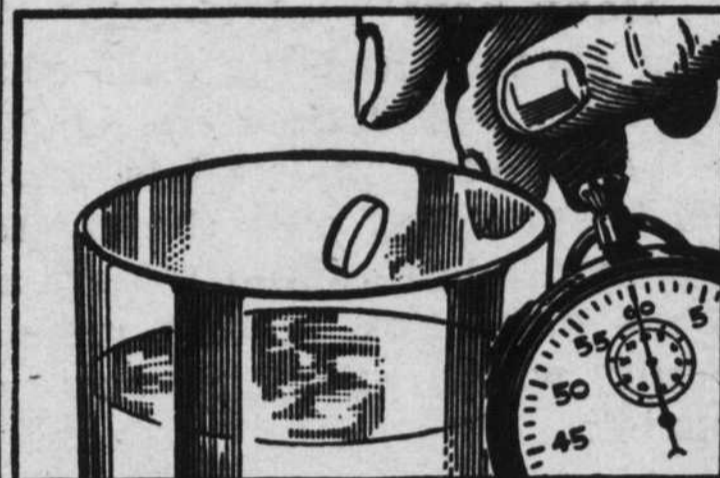
Game statistics proved that, while Las Vegas chalked up five first downs to Ely's three, the local team led in yards gained in rushing.
