Fixing Power Rate Policies

J. D. Ross, administrator of the Bonneville, Oregon, power project, announced that President Roosevelt has approved a 3½ per cent interest rate and forty-year amortizaton plan as the basis for fixing rates for Bonneville power.

Ross, one of the President's chief advisers on power matters, said he hoped the same interest and amortization—paying back the capitol cost plan could be applied to all Federal power projects.

He said the 3½ per cent fortyyear system would be applied to that part of the cost of Bonneville that is allocated to power production.

Ross said his hopes that the Bonneville yardstick would be extended to all Federal projects meant the application of it not only to other projects in the Pacific northwest but to the Tennessee Valley authority projects, Hoover dam and wherever the government is engaged in the producton of power.

The Hoover Dam interest rate is 4 per cent. T.V.A. has no fixed interest rate.—Los Angeles Times.

MASONRY IN GERMANY COMPLETELY SUPPRESSED

But Masonry will rise again in those countries, and its enemies, like the assassins of the early Christian martyrs, will be known only because they struck down that which was good.

Federal Bureau Highway Record

More than 22,000 miles of high-way of all classes were completed under the supervision of the Bureau of Public Roads in the fiscal year that ended June 30. By far the greater portion of this work was done in cooperation with State highway departments and under detailed State supervision. In this class were 11,401 miles of road financed in large part with special emergency funds and 7,367 miles of regular federal-aid work.

Notable progress was made in the Federal program of elimination of hazards at grade crossings in which 1,149 crossings were eliminated, 574 were protected with signals or other devices and 196 grade separation structures were reconstructed. The Federal bureau points out that this work is important because it includes many of the most dangerous crossings on heavily traveled routes that have heretofore been neglected because of the large cost.




