ANDREW McNEAIR, who, as the doorkeeper of the Pennsylvania assemb'y, rang the Liber'y Bell for the reading of the Proclamation of Independence, received the Fellowcra't degree in Lodge No. 2. Philadelphia November 21, 1755.

NOBLE JONES, "the first Mason initiated in Georgia" having been made a Mason in Solomon's lodge No. 1, Savannah, in 1734, died in that city, November 3, 1775.

JAMES MONROE 5th U.S. President was initiated in Williamnsburg (Va.) Lodge No. 6, November 9, 1775, while attending William and Mary college.

GEN. RICHARD BUTLER, who had been made a Mason in Lodge No. 2, Phladelphia, Pa., was killed while fighting the Indians near Fort Recovery, Ohio, November 4, 1791.

OLIVER ELLSWORTH, 3rd U. S. Chief Justice (1796-99) and later U. S. Minister to France, was a charter member of St. John's Lodge, Princeton, N. J. His death occurred at Windsor, Conn., November 26 1807.

ALPHONSO TAFT father of President William Howard Taft Secretary of War and U .S. Atorney Genborn near Tast Townshend, Vt., November 5 1810, and became a member of Kilwinning Lodge, Cincinnati, Ohio.


