family dirty linen any cleaner than does your Hudson,' he added.

"He explained that there was a great need for religion in Nevada. He said that the Episcopal and Roman Catholic churches were doing most of the religious work in the State.

"Of all the men who have made fortunes in Nevada not one has sent back \$1 for welfare work there," Bishop Jenkins declared. 'If I mentioned their names it would come near home. A will was published in the newspapers only a few days ago of a man who made his money in Nevada, but not one cent was left for Nevada.

"He said that he could take his hearers to many towns in the State 'where the people know the name o God only as it is used in cursing and swearing. In one town the little boys and girls bandy around the holy name with as much freedom as their basketballs. I confirmed a class of thirty not long ago composed of boys and girls who had never heard of God's name ecept as an expletive. There's a lot that is loose in Nevada, but there's no mone loose for Christian work'."

This blast was too much for Summerfield, who couldn't resist writing the following letter to the editor of The New York Times:

"A visitor to your city, I read in your paper a statement by Bishop Jenkins from my native state of Nevada in which he castigates its people for their alleged lack of religion and their viewpoint on divorce. He particularly deplores their profanity. Simple fairness to a worthy people and a great state demands a few explicit observations.

"The Bishop has been for many years a neighbor of mine. A fine man he does not understand us nor we him. It is unfortunate that because the social philosophy of Nevada does not square on the one point of marriage and divorce as viewed by the Episcopal Church the good Bishop should be so soured on the whole body politic.



STATE BANKS ARE

NOW ALMOST NIL

A few years ago Nevada boasted 24 state banks and now there are but three left—the Bank of Pioche, the Battle Mountain State bank and the Lander County Bank in Austin. The last two to be taken over by the First National Bank of Nevada, a Transamerica affiliate are the First State Bank of Las Vegas and the Farmers' Bank of Carson Valley.

A Nevadan, well informed on banking conditions in the state and nation, declared recently that if legislation now pending in congress passes and is approved by the president, only a short time will elapse before Nevada will see the disappearance of all state banks.

The bill would permit establishment of branch banks any place within a federal reserve district without regard to state lines. The informant predicted that if the bill becomes law, all banking institutions in Nevada will become branches of large banks in California.

He pointed out that Berkeley, California, has no bank of its own, and that Oakland, with a population ecceeding 250,000 has onl two. Both ciyties are served almost exclusively by branch banks.



QUESTION: Is it true that reversing the direction of stirring when mixing a cake will cause it to have uneven texture?

ANSWER: The direction in which a cake is stirred has nothing to do with the finished result. It is only the amount of stirring that affects texture. However, authorities say that a cake stirred across the bowl instead of with a circular motion is more likely to have tunnels or holes in it.

QUESTION. How can one keep bacon from curling up while broiling or frying it?

ANSWER: Making perforations in the slices of bacon with the points of a fork will help prevent curling. Of course you know about placing bacon in a cold frying pan or on a cold broiler rack. That also prevents curling.

QUESTION: How may I prevent my custard and pumpkin pte filings from soaking through their crusts while they are baking and making them appear soggy?

ANSWER: Merely place the pastry in the oven about five minutes before the filling is poured in. Then you will have the crust already started to bake before the liquids have a chance to come through. Of course you know that custards and pies made with custard fillings should always be baked at a low temperature to assure an even textured and tender product. This low temperature is easily obtained and maintained by the oven of the Hotpoint electric range, for all one has to do is to turn the oven control to the desired temperature and the pie will bake in the desired length of time without any watching and worrying. Furthermore, with a Hotpoint range, you may start your pies in either a cold or preheated oven.

QUESTION: Is there any way to keep wax candles from bending when they are kept in a warm room?

ANSWER: Put a very thin coating of shellac on the candles to make them stand erect. This will not interfere with their burning evenly.

QUESTION: What causes some cakes to have a slightly browner, crisp, ruffly edge around their surfaces when they come out of the oven?

ANSWER: Too large a proportion of fat in the recipe, or a pan that has been greased too heavily, may cause a brown, ruffly edge on the surface of a cake.
