Studying Link To Searchlight

Last Tuesday the Las Vegas Chamber of Commerce and the Junior Chamber of Commerce joined in the meeting at Searchlight to discuss the needed improvement of the highway connecting Las Vegas with Searchlight.

This Highway now turns off the Boulder highway at Railroad Pass. From this point the road is gravel surfaced and continues to be so the entire route to Searchlight and south to the state line.

It is desired that the road be completed to bring the needed tourist trade to this section as well as provide a means of transporting ore from the Searchlight district to smelters east and west. At the same time there will be opened a way for Imperial Valley produce that will shorten the route that they now have to use and make the shipment of these produtes faster and cheaper to the East.

One of the main topics of discussion was the fact that it would provide a road to Parker dam and to Boulder dam from the Cali ornia Nevada state line. The tourists that want to see the Boulder dam and Parker dam then will have the opportunity to turn off at the state line in southern Ariona, continue on to Parker dam and then travel to the mammoth Boulder dam via Searchlight. After that they have a different route to return to their homes in southern California by way of Las Vegas via U. S. highway No. 93 or Kingman via U. S. route No. 66

This road will also open up closer routes to important Ariona cities of Phoenix, Prescott and others It will help the mines in the Arizona districts to ship metallic and nonmetallic ores to the smelters in the Boulder dam area. It will also connect the two great dams-Boulder dam and Parker dam.

George .W Dow of Lone Pine, Cal., and Dr. M. E. Bird of Delta, Utah, were named to represent their respective states in the association. Theterms of offices for all four named are for three years.

Two resolutions directly affecting the status of the national highway in Nevada were passed by the board and are epected to enhance the value of the route as a main eastwest travel artery. The first resolution officially designated and approved the extension of the transcontinental route from Montgomery Pass via Yosemite and into San Francisco, while the second resolution urged the California Board of Public Works to officially designate the route by regulation highway signs and maps.—Tonopah Times.
