**Summerfield To Bishop Jenkins**

The complete text of Lester D. Summerfield's letter to Bishop Jenkins was published in full in the Nevada State Journal of November 13, as follows:

"To The Nevada State Journal:  
"Inasmuch as the New York Times deleted most of the letter I wrote concerning Bishop Jenkins remarks about Nevada, I herewith offer the communication complete:

"A visitor to your city, in which time to time, I read in this morning's issue of your paper a misleading statement by Episcopal Bishop Jenkins from my native state of Nevada in which he castigates its people for their alleged lack of religion and their viewpoint on divorce. He particularly deplores their profanity and indulges in the rather broad assertion that 'I confirmed a class of 30 not long ago composed of boys and girls who had never heard of God's name except as an expletive.' One could almost allow his tirade to be judged entire by the obvious absurdity of that single remark which carries its own repudiation. Simple fairness to a worthy people and a great state demands a few explicit observations.

"In my section of the country a reasonable yardstick of the religion of the people is their practical applications of the teaching of Christianity. Simply to indicate that I speak with knowledge of my subject, let me say that I am chairman of the Washoe county chapter of the Red Cross, have long served there on the council of the Salvation Army, have handled the local financial campaign for the Boy Scouts and for many years have been intimately connected with the social welfare work of the community. That yardstick correctly indicates the standard of religion in Nevada.

Nevada for years held the flag awarded annually by the American Red Cross to the state with the largest membership per capita. Last year it fell to second place but we expect to recapture it in this 1937. In the appeal for funds to help the

flood sufferers in the east last spring, our Washoe county Red Cross chapter trebled its quota fixed in Washington without conducting a drive or sending out a single worker—folks just hustled into headquarters with their donations. All of the other welfare agencies there operate with the same high success because of the humanity and generosity of the people.

"Bishop Jenkins has been for many years a neighbor of mine. He was sent in from the outside to minister to the Episcopal church in Nevada. A fine man, he has, however, never made himself one of us and remains today, as he was when he came, an 'outlander.' He does not understand us, nor we him.

"While all other churches hold services in fine buildings, he has never been able to raise funds to erect a place of worship and services are held in a covered basement—which is as far as he could get in persuading his flock to furnish him with a place for his activities.

"In the same community Catholic Bishop Gorman and Baptist Minister Adams hold forth to overflow congregations in stately buildings. Ask these beloved padres what they think of Nevada's religion, and you will be told by two men who know and understand the people with whom they live.

"It is unfortunate that because the social philosophy of Nevada does not square on the one point of marriage and divorce as viewed by the Episcopal church that the good bishop should be so soured on the whole body politic. It is not his first 'popping off'—we have grown rather accustomed to it. Hence his lament.

"By the way, the good bishop should attend some of the New York theatres. I have been to almost all of the plays. I have known cowboys, miners, lumber jacks and teamsters all of my life—but have never heard any such public profanity as that coming from your stage this season! Just a reflection that plain speaking has not been local in Nevada.

**Jabelmann Made Research Head**

Promotion of Otto Jabelmann to assistant to the president of the Union Pacific Railroad in charge of research, was announced today by President W. M. Jeffers. When all research work of the Union Pacific was consolidated July 1, 1936, Mr. Jabelmann was placed in charge of the department with the title of assistant superintendent of motive power and machinery. Since that time there has been a rapid increase in the development of improved service facilities by the Union Pacific, the designing of which have all been under Mr. Jabelmann's jurisdiction.

Among these have been the turbine-electric locomotive now nearing completion, the mammoth new Dieselelectric locomotives with 5400 horsepower which are to be used on the streamliners "City of Los Angeles" and "City of San Francisco," truck improvements to insure still smoother riding qualities of trains, the new light-weight Challenger train, new light-weight freight cars, new lighting and air-conditioning methods, etc.

Mr. Jabelmann began service with the Union Pacific as a call boy at Cheyenne, his home town, more than 30 years ago. In the course of this period he took "time out" for three years while he completed the engineering course at the University of Michigan. His headquarters will be in Omaha where he has made his home for a number of years. The new appointment is effective November 16.
