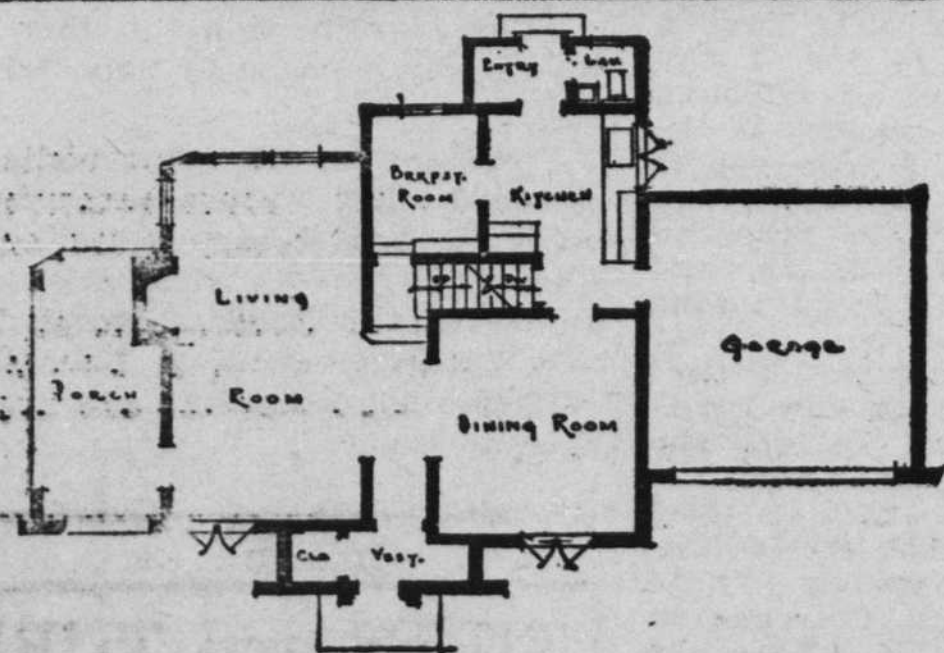

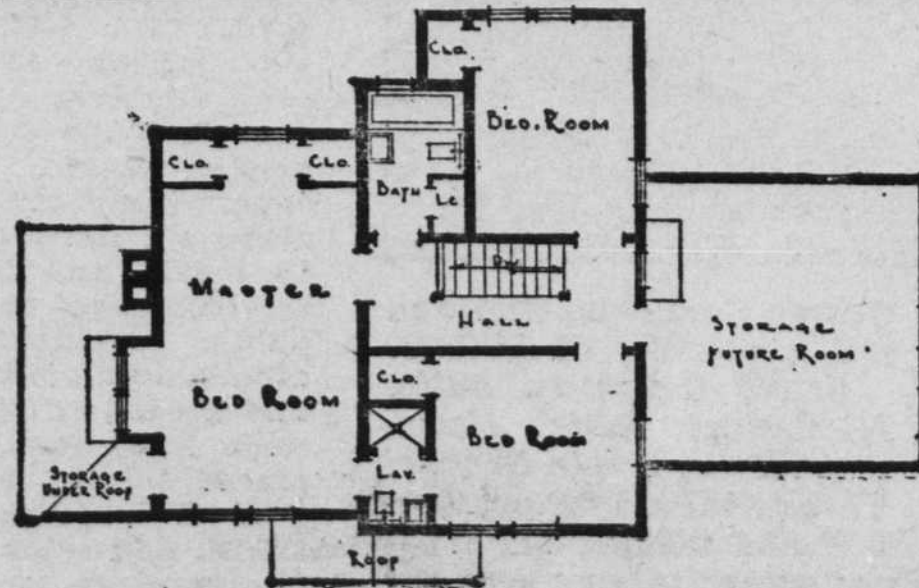

This house, designed by Architect William S. Koch, of Kansas City, Mo., combines brick and stucco in a seven-room house with a two-car attached garage. The Federal Housing Administration issued a commitment to insure a \$7,000 mortgage on the property which is located in Topeka, Kans. A feature of the house is the large master bedroom with open fireplace. The plan permits the addition of an extra bedroom over the garage at a future date, if desired.

Turn them loose on some simple Christmas candy recipe—at the same time delivering a broad hint that Santa Claus will reward them for not sampling their own candies too freely!



Raisin Nut Bars

1/2 cup seedless raisins; 1/2 cup broken walnut meats; 8 squares dipping chocolate.

Line bottom of loaf pan, 8x4 inches, with waxed paper. Wash raisins in hot water and dry thoroughly. Place raisins in pan and sprinkle with nuts. Heat chocolate over boiling water until partly melted; then remove from boiling water and stir rapidly until entirely melted. Pour evenly over raisins and nuts and tap pan several times to settle chocolate. Let stand in cool place to harden. Cut in bars, 1x2 inches. Makes 16 bars.
