

BIDS OPENED ON THREE HIGHWAY PROJECTS

CARSON CITY — Bids on three highway projects approximating \$133,000 were opened before the State Highway Board of Directors by State Highway Engineer Robert A. Allen, on Wednesday afternoon and later awarded to the low bidders — two Nevada firms—on work to be done in Eureka, Washoe and Clark counties.

Award for the construction of a concrete and steel overpass and approaches in Eureka county near Shoshone on Route 1, (U. S. 49) having a length of approximately 0.79 miles was made to the Silver State Construction company, Inc., of Fallon, on a low figure of \$91,459.94.

This work is classified as a Federal Aid Highway project and will begin within 20 days from the date of award and is scheduled to be completed within 175 working days. Reemployment office at Elko will prepare the employment lists for

this structure across the Southern Pacific lines.

H. A. Squires of the headquarters staff will act as Resident Engineer for the State Highway department.

For construction of 7.34 miles of highway in Clark county from Jean to Goodsprings, on state route 53, J. A. Glock was named resident engineer, with the Las Vegas reemployment lists. Work is scheduled for completion within 110 working days.

The bid was awarded only after a careful check and recheck because only \$11 separated the two low bidders. The award finally went to the Silver State Construction company for \$25,049.84, with Young and Sons company, Ltd., of Berkeley coming in as runnerup with a bid of \$25,060.79.

ONE Broadway musical comedy that is attracting visitors, as well as native New Yorkers, (always a sign of success) is the Shubert production of Ed Wynn's new starring vehicle "Hooray For What?"

Ed Wynn, native of Philadelphia, Pa., has earned a reputation in his years of public appearances as a comedian in vaudeville, stage, motion picture and radio performances. His life as a songwriter, however, has not been so heavily publicized, and yet, Wynn is a veteran songwriter and composer, who has written the books, lyrics and music for shows he produced himself, such as "The Ed Wynn Carnival", "The Perfect Fool", "Grab Bag", "Simple Simon" and the "Laugh Parade".

While his name is not identified with any particularly outstanding song success, due largely, of course, to the definite "typing" of himself in the public mind as a comedian, his musical accomplishments were enough to earn him the recognition

of membership in the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers.

The lyrics and music for "Hooray For What?" were supplied by two other members of ASCAP, E. Y. Harburg and Harold Arlen, shown above in that order. "Yip" Harburg, as he is familiarly known, was born in New York City and is a versatile lyricist. His

song hits include "April In Paris", "Isn't It Heavenly" and "Brother, Can You Spare A Dime".

Harold Arlen, born in Buffalo, composer of "Stormy Weather", "I Love A Parade", "Between The Devil And The Deep Blue Sea" and other familiar tunes, wrote the music for "Hooray For What?" including "Down With Love" and "Life Is A Dance", which will soon begin their radio round.

ASCAP's banner on Broadway also includes the Colman, Rogers and Hart show "I'd Rather Be Right" and the Dietz-Schwartz musical "Between the Devil".

consciousness for toasted things. The newness and goodness of flavor that comes along with the mellow, golden brown of toasted food is to me one of the wonders of cookery. Whenever I can ring the "toasted" element into my dishes I do it. One of the most successful recipes I know is this delicious homemade

Toasted Coconut Ice Cream

½ package (scant ½ cup) unflavored ice cream powder; 2 tablespoons sugar; 1 cup milk; 1 cup cream, whipped; 4 drops almond extract; ½ cup shredded coconut, toasted.

Combine unflavored ice cream powder and sugar. Add milk very gradually, stirring until dissolved. Fold in whipped cream and almond extract. Turn into freezing tray of automatic refrigerator, setting control for lowest freezing temperature. Stir when frozen ¼ inch thick on sides and twice more at 20-minute intervals, adding shredded coconut with third stirring. Freezing time: about 3 hours. Makes ¾ quart ice cream.

For 1½ quarts, double recipe above, using full contents of package. Freeze in one or two trays 3 to 6 hours.
