NEW MINING ERA

The development of the Getchell mine and the completion of the 600-ton mill which will begin operation early in February promises to reestablish Nevada as the leading precious metal mining state of the Union.

The property is classed by mining engineers and financiers as probably one of the greatest producers of gold in the world, second only perhaps to the famous Homestake mine.

It will also reestablish George Wingfield with Senator Getchell as financial leaders in the state. The two have long been close friends and devoted supporters of Nevada interests. A vast majority of the people of the state rejoice in the success which has followed their efforts to develop the Getchell mine.

One of the most important elements in the phenomenal developments at the Getchell mine is the attraction to the state of capital for the development and operation of other properties, some of which, perhaps, will become as great as the Getchell mine.

Army Pilot Has Narrow Escape

The 95th Pursuit Squadron of March Field visited Boulder City early in the week as guests of Capt. Charles L. Hall.

Lieut. J. L. Travis, in charge of

the squadron, in taking off from the Boulder City field for the flight home, broke the landing gear of his ship, but was unaware of his plight.

Capt. Hall, who observed the accident to his friend's plane, immediately telephoned the officers at March Field and they, in turn by radio, notified Lieut. Travis, who was then able to make a dead-stick landing and escape unhurt with only slight injury to his ship.

World's Greatest Guitarist

ANDRES SEGOVIA, a Spaniard from the romantic hills of Granada, acclaimed the world's greatest guitarist, will be presented as guest artist on Columbia's Sunday edition of the "Heins Magazine of the Air," January 30th, heard from 5:00 to 5:30 p.m., EST

Segovia, who raised the humble guitar to the status of a concert instrument, will play "Allegro," a special composition written for the guitar by Nicolo Pacaganini, and "Gavotte" by Bach.

Although he was the idol of London, Paris and Madrid for several years, Segovia was practically unknown when he arrived in this country for his first appearance in 1928. His New York debut made musical history, being the first guitar recital given in this city.

By sheer genius Segovia demonstrates undreamed-of possibilities in this poor Cinderella of musical instruments and within the compass of six strings he can achieve an intricate polyphony from the great classics. So remarkable is his talents that composers like DeFalla, Turina and Torroba are writing music especially for him. This will be Segovia's first appearance

America since an extended European tour, and during his eighth visit to this country he will give recitals in all the leading cities.

Employers Must Submit Reports

CARSON CITY, Jan. 26.—Employers of eight or more workers subject to the Nevada unemployment compensation law who are still delinquent in paying their contributions for 1937 were this week given a final warning by Division Director George W. Friedhoff, who pointed out that their negligence will result in an extra levy of 1.8 per cent on their payrolls if back payments are not made before the end of the present month.

Friedhoff in explaining the necessity for quick action on the part of delinquent employers, stressed the fact that the internal revenue department, which collects the 2 per cent tax imposed by title IX of the social security law, has recently ruled that no blanket time extensions will be granted this year. January 31 is the deadline set by the department.

A telegram received from the bureau of internal revenue Tuesday advised division officials that unemployment compensation back payments may be made up to midnight of January 31 and that credit would be allowed. Division accounting officials added that payments may be made to unemployment

Nevada Silver Storage Urged

Senator Key Pittman announced in Washington Wednesday he will soon take up with Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr. his request to have a silver vault established at Hawthorne.

Pittman last year suggested that such a vault be constructed for the purpose of storing silver, but several questions came up which interfered with the plan.

The vault and the building in which it will be housed would be constructed at an estimated cost of \$50,000.

Asked whether he thought that the drop of the price of silver paid by the treasury department for newly mined silver would not retard production and thus possibly eliminate the practicability of the vault, Pittman said: "I hardly think so. The vaults would store government-owned silver awaiting shipment to the mints. Fact is, it would be an ideal location for such a vault."
