Rotary Hears of Air Travel

Walter E. Bond was program chairman for the day at the meeting of Las Vegas Rotary Club Thursday noon. He introduced as speaker of the day, Tom Wolfe, traffic manager of Western Air Express, who gave an interesting talk on the subject of air travel.

The speaker stated that his company now has the huge sum of fifty-eight million miles of flying to its credit.

"Transportation is very vital to Las Vegas," the speaker said. Your tourist trade, your biggest industry, is entirely dependent on transportation.

"In the not far distant future our lines will be extended into Canada and then into Alaska. Thence, extensions will be made along the Aleutian Islands to the Orient. We are using every means to 'put Las Vegas across.' Among other things in connection with our associate company, United Air Lines, we are putting out this year 3,600,000 folders, all of which feature the Las Vegas area as a tourist attraction.

"You should adopt the policy of putting on a show at all times here in Las Vegas. You should all wear colorful, western costumes, with broad brimmed hats and cowboy boots in harmony with the unusual feature of desert life. You have marvelous things to offer. The 750,000 tourists who came here last year were attracted by your unusual desert attractions."

Speaking of safety in travel the speaker said that an occasional accident in air transportation hurts because people do not get the other side of the story. Last winter we had the first passenger fatality in our history of 43,000 flights up to that time. If a person should fly 15,000 miles a year, it would take him 400 years to reach the average miles of travel to each fatality in air travel.

The speaker declared that flying is eleven times more safe than automobile travel. Air travel fatalities have averaged 46 to each 1,125,-000 passengers carried while automobile travel records 47 fatalities to every 100,000 travelers.

The speaker closed his discourse by declaring that insurance companies which run their business for making money, are gambling at the ratio of 20,000 to one that an airplane passenger will arrive at his destination alive, because they are selling \$5,000 trip policies for 25 cents, the same rate charged on railroads.

Art Trelease gave some cowboy songs and the quartette consisting of Stanley Arnott Roy Martin, Harvey Stanford and Roscoe Hampton did some "barbershop" harmonies very acceptibly.

President Frank Gusewelle urged all to join with Rotarians from Kingman, San Bernardino, Needles and other places in the Three State jollification at Needles Saturday evening. Several members announced intention of going.

Date of Synod Definitely Set

The week of May 2 has been definitely set as the meeting time for the annual Synod of Pacific Province of the Episcopal Church which is to meet in Las Vegas and Boulder City this year. According to the Rt. Rev. Thomas Jenkins, Bishop of Nevada, the Most Rev. H. St. George Tucker Presiding Bishop of the American Church will be the principle speaker at the Synod.

As yet the schedule of the business meeting has not been set but the plan is to compact this into two days so that the rest of the week may be spent in seeing the scenic area in and around Las Vegas and Boulder City.

In conjunction with the Synod the ladies of the Womens Auxiliary of the Province will hold their annual meeting. The Nevada Church Service league will be led by Mrs. Geo. Schwartz of Elko. Delegates from every part of the province are expected to attend, and to date each parish has pledged itself at least one delegate.

Final arrangements for the meeting will be made by the Rt. Rev. Geo. Sanford of Fresno and the Synod Council at a meeting in his cathedral this next week. Local plans wil be made for the entertainment of the delegates and guests at a combined meeting of the Las Vegas and Boulder City congregations when Bishop Jenkins and the District Treasurer, Miss Ruth Jenkins visit Las Vegas late this month for a final survey of accomodations for housing and entertaining such a large group. Approimately 600 to 1000 are expected to attend.
