

Thousands Seek Fun Zone Prize

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 10—More than 200,000 entries have been received in the Name-the-Fun Zone contest of the 1939 Golden Gate International Exposition.

Thousands of colorful names suggesting gaiety and romance are on file for judges to consider, each a bid for the \$1000 prize offered for the best designation of the 40-acre amusement area at the World's Fair of the West. A total of more than 250,000 names are expected for the area where world famous showmen are planning thrilling concessions.

Death Valley Road Contract

CARSON CITY, Nev., Feb. 10—The Nevada Rock and Sand Company of Reno was awarded the contract for a highway construction project in Nye county from Death Valley to Beatty by the Board of Directors of the State highway department at a meeting held in Carson City recently.

This company had submitted a bid Wednesday afternoon of \$41,872, which was low in the field of eight competitors.

Ed Barber, recently of the head-quarter's staff, will act as resident engineer for the department of highways, being stationed at Beatty, Nevada.

The length of new road will be approximately 8.84 miles in Nye County from the East Boundary of Death Valley National Monument to Beatty, Route 58, Section A. Work is scheduled to start within 20 days and the contract calls for completion within 110 working days from the date of award. This contract is a Federal Lands Highway Project, and the reemployment office at Tonopah will prepare the employment lists.

Boys and Girls May Win Prizes

4-H boys and girls should start their farm account book at once to put them in line for an award in the fifth National Farm Account Contest which offers 805 prizes totaling \$8,500 in cash and merchandise. The contest is conducted by state and federal extension agents.

March 1 is the last date on which the books may be opened. They are required to cover 12 consecutive months and may also be started as of January 1 and February 1. Club members interested in enrolling may secure blank books and rules and the prize lists through their local leader or county agent. Prizes will be awarded on the basis of individual accomplishments alone, and all material in the records will be held confidential and returned to the owners after the judging. Contestants must also submit an analysis of their record of 100 words or less, showing the principal sources of profit and loss and suggesting how to make the farm pay better.

Parents are urged to cooperate in keeping the records, which have proved of such value in the last four contests that they have been continued. Any bona fide clubster is eligible and any fine records in the past have been submitted by both boys and girls in their early teens.

Contestants who submit the five best records will receive awards of \$500 to \$100 and 800 others will be given cash prizes of \$5 to \$25. All awards are made by the International Harvester Company to encourage good farm management through a comprehensive but simple accounting system.

WITH the first warmth and balm of spring comes always the mouth-watering memory of tangy, green rhubarb. A grand way to capture the young freshness of this early favorite for the months to come is to make a batch of rhubarb jam. And you can cast aside all fears of failure if you use bottled fruit pectin to supply the correct amount of "jelling."



Rhubarb Jam

3 cups (1½ lbs.) prepared fruit;
5 cups (2¼ lbs.) sugar; ½ bottle fruit pectin.

To prepare fruit, slice fine or chop about 2 pounds rhubarb. Do not peel. Red-stalked rhubarb gives the best color. Add 1 cup sugar; let stand 15 minutes. This cup of sugar is in addition to the 5 cups specified above. If desired, add 1 teaspoon ginger or other spice. If stalks are not red, red coloring may be added.

Measure sugar and prepared fruit into large kettle. Mix well, and bring to a full rolling boil over hottest fire. Stir constantly before and while boiling. Boil hard 3 minutes. Remove from fire and stir in bottled fruit pectin. Skim; pour quickly. Paraffin hot jam at once. Makes about 8 glasses (6 fluid ounces
