## Detects Deadly Monoxide Gas

So compact that it may be installed in the glove compartment of the average automobile, a new midget type Power Prover has been perfected by Cities Service engineers and is now being used in experimental safety work throughout the country.

The instrument is so sensitive that by dual switches the investigator may read simultaneously the percentage of unburned gasoline being blown out through the exhaust pipe and the carbon monoxide content of the car interior while on the highway.

The development of the new machine is of great scientific value and is being used in carbon monoxide research toward eliminating the hundreds of thousands of "unexplained" highway accidents each year.

## Named Members Of Power Board

The Board of City Commissioners will this evening probably announce the names of the five appointed members of the Las Vegas Electric Light and Power board, provision for which was made in an ordinance recently adopted by the board.

It is provided that members of the board appointed by the City commissioners shall be appointed for terms of one, two, three, four and five years respectively and their successors be appointed for five year terms. Members are to serve without compensation. The board is to act in a purely advisory capacity to the board of city commissioners, in all things pertaining to the acquisition or construction of a municipally owned electric light and power system for the city of Las Vegas and in the operation thereof when acquired or constructed.

Those who have been proposed as members of the new board are W. E. Ferron, Wm. H. Pike, John F. Miller and Bryan Bunker. No publicity has been given as to who the fifth members may be.
