Applicants must be between the ages of 18 and 35 years, single, without dependents, of good character; and be qualified to pass a musical examination on the instrument of their selection.

The musical examination will be conducted by the Band Leader, 38th Infantry Band, Fort Douglas, Utah. Arrangements for interested men to take the examination will be made by the Recruiting Station nearest the applicants home.

12,000 Cars Can Park on Island

SAN FRANCISCO, March 10—Parking concession contract on Treasure Island for the 1939 Golden Gate International Exposition has been awarded to Smith & Kattelman, Los Angeles, it was announced by Harris D. H. Connick, Chief Director of the Exposition.

The parking area is 80 acres and when paved will be equivalent to 40 miles of road. Twelve thousand automobiles can be parked at one time.

An administration building and service station will be built at a cost of \$180,000.

Connick said parking rates will probably be 35 or 40 cents.

A replica of the famed Alamo to house the exhibits of Texas at the 1939 World's Fair of the West on Treasure Island is being planned by the Exposition commission of the Lone Star state.

Trees weighing as much as 20 tons each will be transplanted on Treasure Island as a part of the \$1,500,000 horticultural beautification that will make the 1939 Golden Gate International Exposition a 400-acre garden.
