Death Valley Fully Signed

Getting on the wrong road in the Death Valley area is almost impossible now with the region re-signed with big new porcelain enamel markers.

In and around the national monument have been posted approximately 650 new directional signs within the last few weeks. Erected by the Automobile club of Southern California crews, they direct travel to practically every point of interest in the valley country.

This marks the twenty-sixth year the motorists' organization has carried on signposting and maintenance work in Death Valley. In the early days when the diamond shaped plaques were being erected a truck often covered only 30 miles a day. Now the club's streamlined sign vehicles go from 160 to 200 miles a day in this activity.

TESTED RECIPE

WITH most of us work-a-day folk our Sunday morning breakfast is the favorite meal of the week—a meal we can consume at leisure. And, it seems only proper such a meal should contain special treats that can only be served when everyone has plenty of time in which to enjoy them. Even a member of the family with a soul above food—will roll an eye full of glistening anticipation when you open the waffle iron to display this savory treasure—



Bacon Bran Waffles

1 cup milk; 1 cup whole bran shreds; ¾ cup sifted flour; ¾ teaspoon double-acting baking powder; ½ teaspoon salt; 2 egg yolks, well beaten; 4 tablespoons melted butter or other shortening; ½ cup chopped cooked bacon; 2 egg whites, stiffly beaten.

Pour milk over bran and let stand 5 minutes. Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Add egg yolks, and butter to bran mixture. Add flour and blend. Add bacon. Fold in egg whites. Bake in hot waffle iron. Makes four 4-section waffles.

NOTE: One cup finely cut uncooked bacon may be substituted for cooked bacon in this recipe. Sprinkle bacon over batter just before closing waffle iron.
