## Federal Loans On Nevada Wool

New Federal loans to Nevada wool growers for 1937 and 1938 will be available shortly, according to word received from Washington by the University of Nevada agricultural extension service.

To be made from a federal fund of fifty million dollars for the nation as a whole, the loans will be made in accordance with the 1938 agricultural adjustment act and are intended particularly to aid in the marketing of the clip of this year.

Since wool is one of Nevada's primary agricultural crops, the new loan program is being looked into with interest by ranchers throughout the state.

In 1937, Nevada's wool production was nearly six million pounds and came from 744,000 sheep. Both production and sheep numbers were slightly under the year before.

The new loans will be available to all producers, including, under approved regulations, producer-owned pools, the extension service has been informed.

Two such cooperative organizations are active in Nevada, the Nevada Wool Marketing association, with headquarters in Ely, which is affiliated with the National Wool Marketing association, and the Pacific Wool Growers Association, which has headquarters in Portland, Oregon.

## Beautify Homes In Boulder City
