COUNTY FINANCES

A large item in the expenditures of Clark County is the office of district attorney, a considerable portion of which is due directly to the squandering of time in prosecution of cases to further political ambitions or personal grudges and, in much greater degree, in carrying on the private law practice of the district attorney and his deputies.

The business of the district attorney's office, except perhaps during terms of court or some occasional emergencies, could be carried on efficiently by one good attorney with a stenographer.

However we find that the district attorney of Clark VEGAS BEAUTIFUL-County requires two deputies and a stenographer to do the legal work of the county and carry on the private practice of the firm.

The district attorney and his deputies draw regular salaries from the county for all their services but devote a considerable portion of their time to their private law practice, none of the fees for which are turned into the county treasury. And the larger and more lucrative the private practice, the less time they devote to the public business and what they say. Yet without cotton the more deputies they require.

THE GIANTS FALL

Today I witnessed the giant cottonwood trees at the corner of Fourth and Fremont streets brought march of improvements.

Thirty-two years ago just about this time of the year, with the aid of a workman, I planted puny looking cottonwood posts which have grown into the majestic trees lifting their spreading green branches sixty feet above the sidewalks. For more than thirty years I have walked in the grateful coolness of their shade or stood and read the advertising show cards tacked upon the trunk of the tree on the corner.

So it is not without a pang of regret that I see my old friend fall to the ground, their lives of usefulness and beauty ended.

After these cottonwood posts had been growing two or three years and had nice litle tufts of green about their heads, it appeared that they were too far apart to make the dense shade we wanted. So we bought some little Japanese umbrella trees and planted them between the cotton woods. The umbrella trees grew well for a few years until the cottonwoods overtopped and overpowered them and so they were removed without being missed several years ago.

COTTONWOODS MADE LAS

We hear much outcry against cottonwoods for one reason or another. One person says they draw the richness from their lawns so that the grass does not grow well. Others

complain of the cotton flying in the air every spring. Others profess to see no beauty in their great spreading branches.

Perhaps there is some reason in woods, Las Vegas would have languished and relapsed into a mere stopping place for railroad trains. The first cottonwood tree on the present Las Vegas townsite was purely accidental. Mrs. Smith, who built the Palace hotel in the spring of 1905, needed a couple of posts to which to attach her clothes line. So she hired a man to go down near the creek and cut a couple of strong posts and plant them in the rear of the Palace Hotel.

One day, in the heat of the first terrible summer in Las Vegas, I was walking toward town when, glancing that way I saw a little gleam of green on one of Mrs. Smith's clothes line posts. I found a clump of green leaves and twigs. That tree stood for many years as

an example to the people and a convincing argument to the effect that trees would grow on this townsite. although the wise ones declared emphatically that trees could never be made to grow here except along the creek banks.

Following the example of a few optimistic citizens who planted cottonwood posts, we worked up considerable public sentiment and in the years 1909 and 1910, perhaps some other years, we had annual tree planting days.

So it came about that Las Vegas became a delightful and beautiful oasis in the desert, with great spreading cottonwood trees meeting overhead and converting the streets into tunnels of grateful cool-
