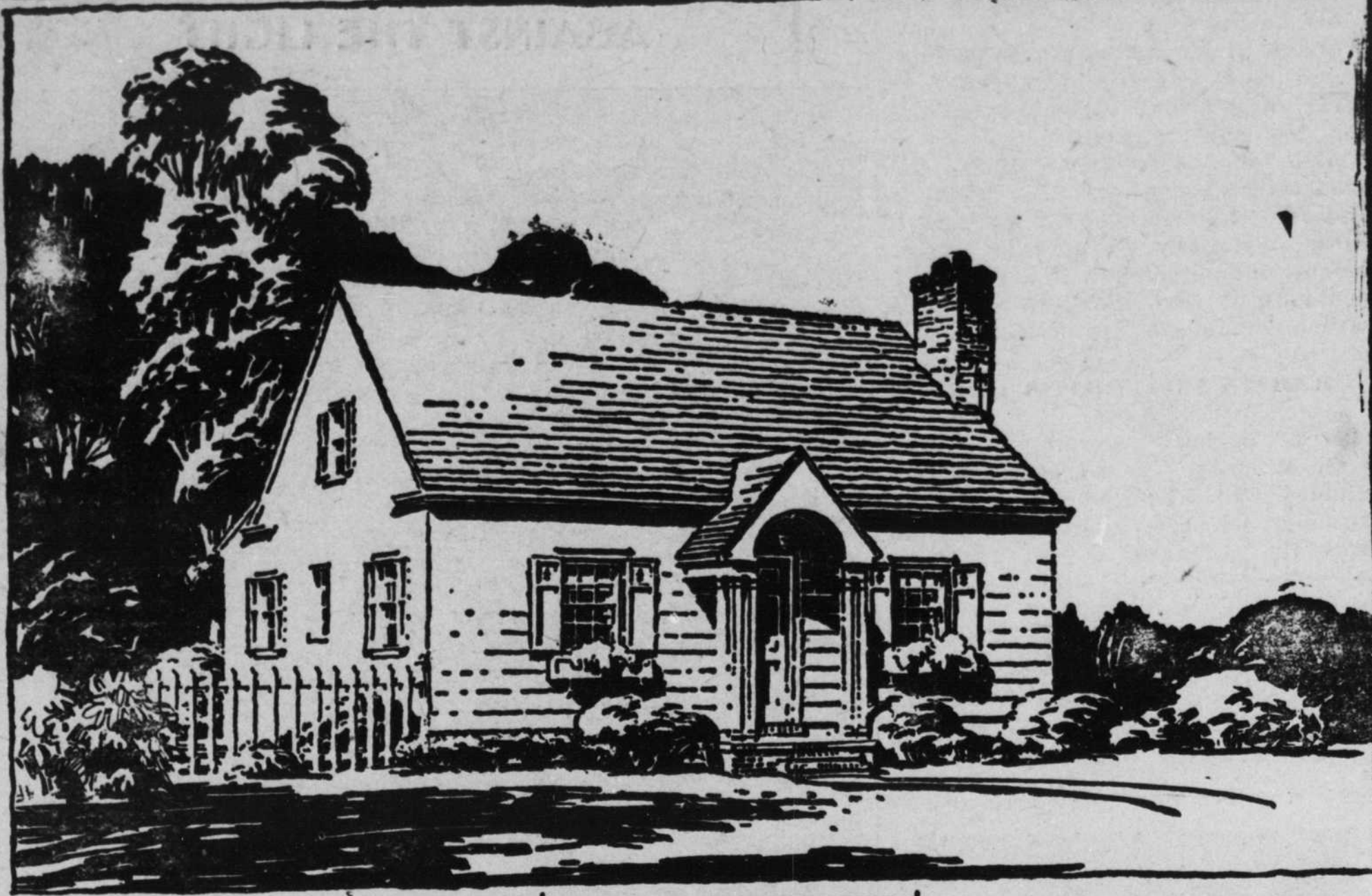
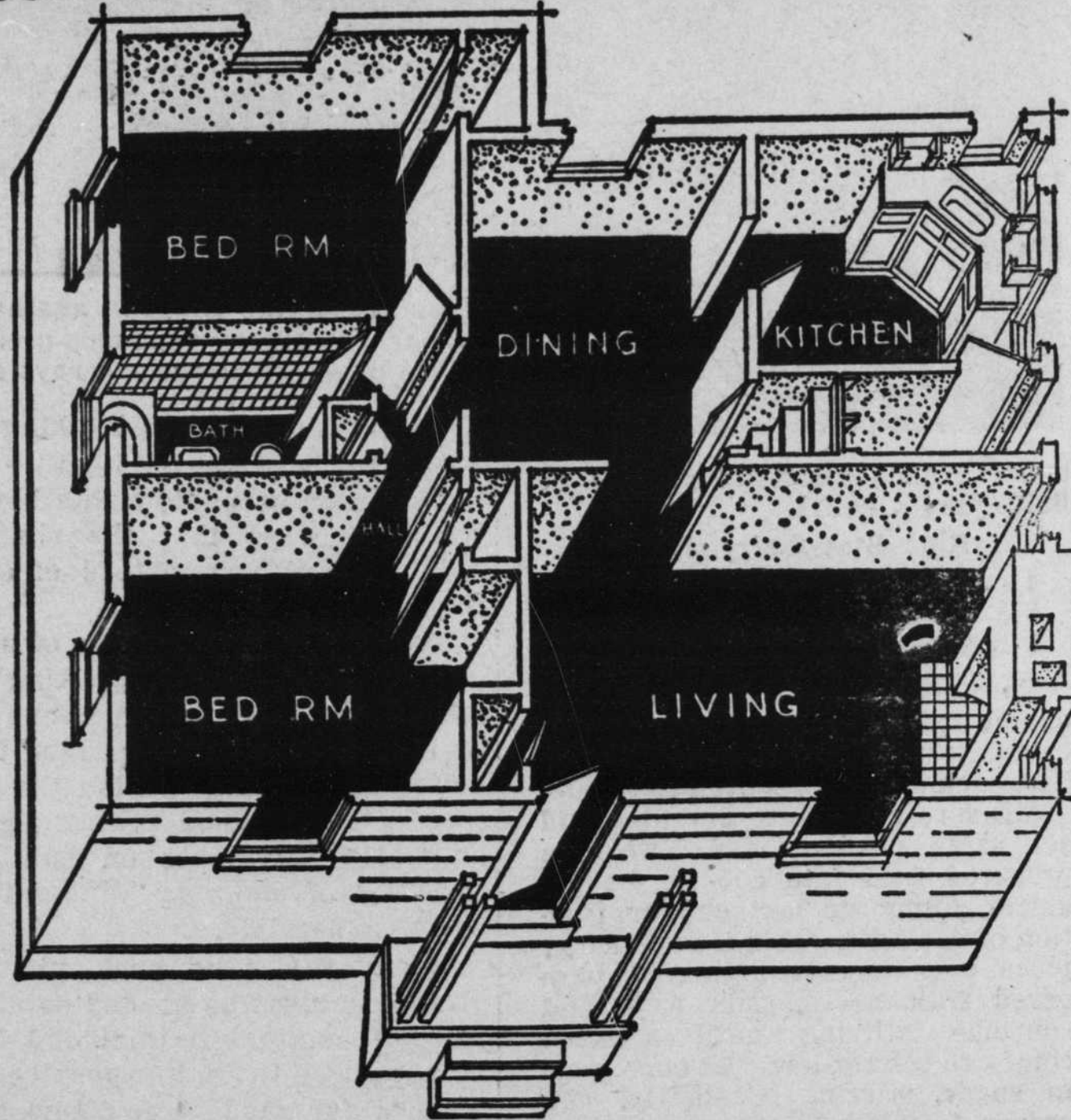


## Roomy but Not Costly



This small home has a room arrangement that allows for the use of a maximum amount of space. Rooms are larger than usually encountered in a small dwelling. Living room is ornamented by an open fireplace. The top floor is unfinished but has space for additional bedrooms.

The house is located at Rochelle Park, N. J., and was appraised at \$5,750. The Federal Housing Administration has insured a loan of \$3,500 on the house. The mortgage will be fully amortized in monthly installments of \$23.45 over a period of 19½ years. These payments included interest and principal.

### Fertilizer Usage

**G**ARDENS can't go on producing excellent flowers and vegetables year after year without an application of fertilizer now and then.

The average gardener does not give his soil proper nourishment. While stable manure is excellent fertilizer and should be used wherever possible, it is difficult to obtain. Commercial fertilizers are available, but gardeners fail to use them because they haven't time to study soil composition and then figure out the chemical mixture best suited to their soils.

Here are a few simple, practical, non-technical hints on fertilizing. First, be cautious! Never apply fertilizers recklessly or over-abundantly.

For general, all-purpose fertilizing, use a complete fertilizer recommended by your local dealer.

If your garden has been generally productive, either use no fertilizer at all, or apply a complete fertilizer sparingly. Broadcast it over the soil 10 days before planting, using not more than one or two pounds per square rod. See what effect that amount has. Never under any condition use more than six to eight pounds of commercial fertilizer per square rod. Three pounds is a good average application.

Three or four weeks after planting, if the garden seems backward, apply a side dressing. To side dress, sprinkle fertilizer lightly alongside the rows, about six inches from the plants; then cultivate. Apply from one to two pounds a square rod.

Don't be like the man who saw a friend get good results from a sparing use of fertilizer. He tried to get results ten times as good by using ten times as much fertilizer. He destroyed his crop.

An excess of vegetative growth or a failure to set fruit often indicates too much rich manure or too heavy nitrate fertilizer.
