THE SYNOD

Las Vegas is highly honored in having as its guests the coming week the distinguished group of several hundred men and women composing the Synod of the Province of the Pacific of the Episcopal Church.

Never before have we been privileged to entertain a group so outstanding in spiritual and intellectual attainments as are the several hundred Bishops and other high officials of the Episcopal Church who will be here.

The Synod should be of great value to Las Vegas as an indication that we are something more than a community of frivolous pleasure seekers, as we have so often been pictured

MUNICIPAL POWER REPORT

The report of the Las Vegas Power Board to the City Commissioners which resulted in the abandonment of the movement instituted more than three years ago for the building and operation of a Municipal Power System, showed considerable careful thought on the part of the board.

The larger part of the report was devoted to discussing the necessity of obtaining expert and reliable knowledge before plunging blindly into what might easily become a most disappointing and expensive enterprise—disappointing to those who might hope to see power rates reduced and expensive for the taxpayers who must inevitably pay the costs.

However, what seems to be the controlling feature of the report is the following paragraph:


"A very serious phase of this whole matter is the political angle. Can it be kept out of politics? Has it been kept out of politics in like situations?

"One thing we all agree on is that, if it is possible that a municipal power plant might be made a 'political football', we should drop the whole matter now."

It is obvious that the writers of that report have in mind some of the past history of Las Vegas municipal government, because we all remember times when the controlling political elements sought city offices for the sole purpose of furthering their own private interests.

Observing the scandals which have plagued other municipalities, large and small and remembering some of the sad experiences of our own city, it is readily understandable that a group of sensible business men should be reluctant
