Rambler Writes Of Death Valley

DEATH VALLEY JUNCTION, Cal. May 5—The Rambler met and chatted awhile the other day with a couple of prospectors—Granfell and Anderson, by name—who were loading on a few supplies in Death Valley Junction. They were traveling by automobile from near Yuma, Arizona, to the Emigrant Springs District in the Panamint mountains west of Death Valley where they are leasing. These boys carried the typical outfit, the only thing different from the prospectors' outfit of 30 to 40 years ago being the absence of burros. They were traveling in sedans, which carried the regulation outfit, such as cooking utensils, 5-gallon cans of water, gasoline, provisions, tools etc. They had the faithful companion alright, the dog. Also they had bedding and tents, for camping out. There are some disadvantages in the modern prospectors' transportation facilities, such as the inability of the auto to virtually climb rugged mountain sides, as the burro did, to cross running streams without a road, and to browse about the desert for food. But then there are many advantages, such as the easy, more rapid riding, and capacity for carrying provisions and tools. Also the comfort provided by an old sedan for a cozy, warm place to sleep in inclement weather. Granfell and Anderson reported a splendid orebody in a mine, 15 or 20 miles west of Yuma being operated by M. A. and George Holmes of Silver Queen fame. The ore is said to average from \$25 to \$40 per ton.
