
Built For Beauty-For Comfort-\$4,000

Stock Show To Open Saturday

NORTH SALT LAKE—Governor Henry H. Blood will attend the official opening of the Intermountain Junior Fat Stock show which will be held at the Salt Lake Union Stock yards, north Salt Lake, June 7, 8, 9 E. J. Maynard, manager of the show has announced.

Program arrangements have been completed by officials of the show. Entries will be received up until noon June 4. After delivery of the animals, exhibitors and county agents or Future Farmers of America instructors will be registered June 5 and 6 by the Salt Lake chamber of commerce and they will be issued badges, programs, and banquet tickets.

The livestock committee of the Salt Lake chamber of commerce with Ray Wilson as chairman, the Salt Lake Union stock yards, Livestock Marketing association, and the Salt Lake and Davis county commissioners are cooperating in staging the show.

A parade will be held June 6, at 2 p.m. on the Salt Lake City streets beginning at the corner of North Temple and Main streets. The Box Elder high school band under the direction of W. H. Adams will lead the parade which will include exhibitors, sponsors, and animal entries. An amateur hour supervised by KSL, in which only exhibitors can take part, will begin at 7 p.m. at the arena.

Tuesday, June 7, will be the official opening of the show. The Davis county high school band will play from 8:30 until 9 a.m. Notables in attendance will be Governor Blood, Mayor J. M. Wallace, C. H. Skidmore, superintendent of public instruction, L. E. Ellison, Davis and Salt Lake county commissioners, and show officials.

Judging of fat lambs will begin at 9:30 and best showmen in open classes for the showmanship contest will be selected and 50 of the best lambs will be chosen for individual and group sale. Professor William G. Kammlade of the Utah State Agricultural College will be the judge.

Dean W. E. Carroll of the Utah State Agricultural college is slated to judge the hogs, Tuesday at 1 p.m., according to Manager Maynard. The same procedure will be followed.

Cattle judging will follow the some procedure as lamb and hog judging and wil begin Wednesday at 9 a.m. Tours of the Cudahy plant will be taken Wednesday and Thursday and carcass demonstrations will be presented so exhibitors can study the carcass on the hook as well as the animal on the hoof. The last day of the show will be taken up with the sale and grouping of livestock. A banquet will be held at 6:30 p.m. at which time prizes will be awarded the winners.
