Blythe Pitches Sensational Game For Tonopah Against Marines

Larry Blythe, 19 year old, 6 ft. 4 youngster, who has been employed in the Death Valley district for the past year or two, and who has served a greater part of that time as one of the pitchers for the Death Valley ball team, pitched a sensational game last Sunday (May 22) for Tonopah, against the strong Hawthorne (Nevada) Marines, from the Government Munitions plant,

on the Tonopah grounds. Blythe, owing to the recent rigid reduction of employes in the D. V. district, and particularly to the closing of Furnace Creek Inn, where he had been employed during the past winter season, left the district a couple of weeks ago. He headed north, and it seems, "caught on" with the Tonopah team, at least, for the game last Sunday. In the box score and detailed account of the game, read by the Rambler, in the Tonopah Daily of Monday, Blythe went in the box with the score tied in the beginning of the fourth. Only three hits were made off him in the six innings he pitched. He struck out 11 men, and in the sixth with the bases loaded, he hit a two-bagger which helped to "put the game on ice."

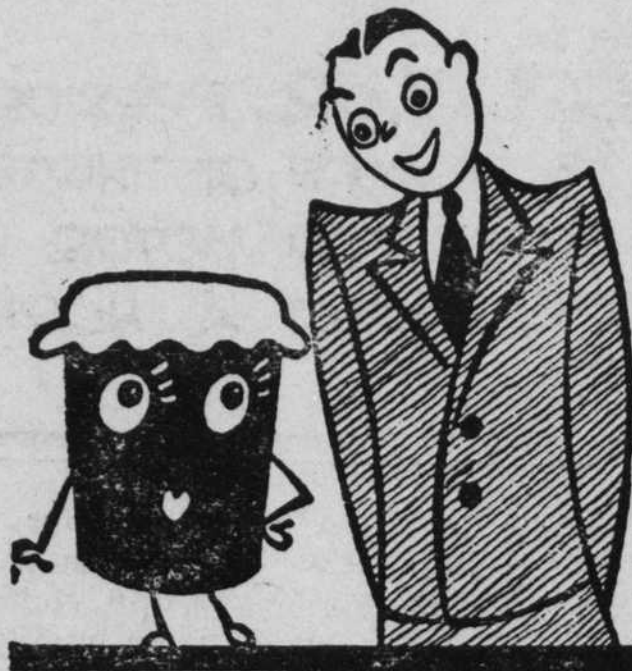

Ginger and Pears Cooperate In Jam



"ALL pears are but a heavy meat, unless they are well boiled or baked," said Pliny hundreds of years ago. This delicious pear jam would certainly have displeased that wise and ancient man . . . it requires only a half-minute boil! The recipe is highly recommended by the Jelly-Making Club:

Ginger and Ripe Pear Jam

4 cups (2 lbs.) prepared fruit
1/2 to 1 cup diced crystallized ginger
7 1/2 cups (3 1/4 lbs.) sugar
1 bottle fruit pectin

To prepare fruit, peel, core, and crush completely or grind about 3 pounds fully ripe pears. Dice about 1/2 pound crystallized ginger.

Measure sugar and prepared fruit, solidly packed, into large kettle. Add ginger, mix well, and bring to a full rolling boil over hot-test fire. Stir constantly before and while boiling. Boil hard 1 minute. Remove from fire and stir in bottled fruit pectin. Then stir and skim by turns for just 5 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Pour quickly. Paraffin hot jam at once. Makes about 11 glasses (6 fluid ounces each).

Hiway Contracts To Be Awarded

CARSON CITY, Nev. — G. B. Brockway, with headquarters at Silver Peak, will act as resident engineer during the construction of about 10.68 miles of asphaltic road-mix construction on the state highway system from Blair Junction to Silver Peak in Esmeralda County. A graveled road courses from Tonopah to Silver Peak, but the south ten miles will be oiled first because most of the travel occurs between the Silver Peak mine and mill within this area.
