

As a result of this first step we have learned more and more the importance of specializing travel for women," Jeffers continued, " and we are establishing a woman's department of the Union Pacific with more than 60 trained women making up its personnel."

As a girl Miss Lobdell discarded dolls to play railroad and as she grew to womanhood tried her hand with a stage stock company and ater began her career as a newspaper woman. In 1916 she was apointed one of four women passener agents for the Union Pacific and rapidly climbed the ladder of responbility and promotions until she was made special representative of he executive vice president in No. vember, 1935. This latter position brought her in closer association ith women and her wide travel experience won her the new promo-

woman in the United States.
