### **Tourists Source** Of Vast Income

Don Thomas, managing director of the "All-Year Club," Los Angeles, in an address before the Los Angeles Realty Board recently, discussed the problem of rising taxes and suggested means whereby the load may be spread.

Mr. Thomas made the statement that tourists left in Southern California las year the astonishing sum of \$216,713,000. exceeded only by the amount produced by Southern California's vast oil industry.

Since the same conditions, in a lesser degree, apply to Las Vegas and the Boulder Dam area, we print below a condensation of Mr. Thomas' address:

"Tonight I want to discuss with you a topic which reently occupied the attention of the Southern California business leaders represented on the All-Year club board of directors - the rising costs of government and what can be done to spread the tax load. You, as real estate men, are particularly interested, not only because of the taxes you pay, but because high taxes make your sales more difficult.

During the present period of recession, it is natural to ask, "How shall Los Angeles county deal with this condition?" There are two ways to cope with mounting governmental costs.

The first, cut down the budget but this is difficult because the preponderance of your tax bill consists of mandatory charges.

The second alternative has been given all too little consideration and it is; increase community income so taxes are easier for everybody to pay.

Los Angeles county citizens have four sources of primary (new) income - the oil industry, motion picture industry, citrus industry and the tourist industry. The first three of these can be increased only by private enterprise. The fourth, the tourist industry, is the only one capable of increase by our citizens acting collectively through the county government.

Tourists ranked second only to oil last year, as the largest individual sources of primary income in Southern California, the ranking being as follows:

The \$216,713,000 spent in Southern California by tourists last year was NEW money imported to increase the wealth of our citizens and, since you, as realtors, are vitally interested in the source of our tax revenues, it is pertinent to ask, "how important is tourist money as a source of taxes?"

Out-of-state tourists paid the state of California last year in gasoline tax \$3,254,189 and \$3,145,000 in sales and, a total of \$6,399,189 in sales and gascline taxes alone. Of this, \$710,114 was reapportioned to Los Angeles county for highway and record can be maintained for the school maintenance.

But this is only part of the tax revenues which tourists produce. Careful surveys establish that a \$500,000,000 capital investment in - Los Angeles county is dependent upon tourists. This hfal billion dollar capital structure pays nine mililon dollars annually toward general city and county taxes here. One visualizes the size of this sum when you
