## **University Goes** On Air July 20th

The services of the University of Nevada to the people of the state will be portrayed to a nation-wide radio audience Wednesday, July 20, when students, faculty, and alumni go on the air for an hour over the National Broadcasting Company blue network

Broadcast over a chain of nearly a hundred stations covering the nation, the program will include dramatic episodes, music, and talks. It will be broadcast from a studio on the campus set up especially for the occasion by NBC engineers from San Francisco. The program will go on the air at 8:30 A.M., PST, and will last for an ohur.

Opening with a description of the campus, the program will then provide a description of the State's outstanding characteristics by Silas E. Ross, chairman of the University's board of regents.

Three historical episodes in dramatic form will portray the founding of agriculture and mining in the state, the provisions for the University of Nevada in the state constitutional convention, and the opening exercises as the University got under way in Reno after its removal from Elko.

Alumni all over the country will again hear the Morrill Hall bell which called them to classes when they were students.

The agricultural services of the university to th state will be portrayed in three incidents representative of the work of the College of Agriculture, the Extension Service, and the Experimental Station.

An interview with a professor of the McKay School of Mines and two mining students from the Hunt prespecting crew will tell of the work of that division of the institution and of other engineering
