#### **Church Joins** Disease War

The battle to eradicate venereal disease was given the support of the Episcopal Church of Nevada Sunday when a resolution endorsing the anti-venereal disease campaign was adopted at the thirtieth annual convocation of the Episcopal Church, meeting at Galilee, Lake Tahoe.

The resolution, adopted unanimously, follows.

"Resolved: The convocation of the missionary district of Nevada wishes to commend and thank Dr. Robert Caples, director of public health, for the vigorous course he has followed in his recent anti-venereal campaign. His work deserves the praise of all right thinking people, and we wish to assure him of the cooperation of the Episcopal Church in this district whenever possible."

The convocation also pleaded for observance of Good Friday as a full holiday, while officers and committees for the ensuing term were also chosen. Principal address was given by the Rt. Rev. Thomas Jenkins, D D., Bishop of Nevada.

"Speaking generally and without recourse to figures." he said, "I believe it is safe to affirm that the church is moving forward, not in adding to our members alone but in her influence in the life of the people Through mission stations, itinerant work and correspondence courses of study, we are covering the entire state."

Referring to remarks he is alleged to have made, he said:

Commenting on the lack or coldness of home and school cooperation, Bishop Jenkins continued:

"Added to the indifference of the home is the monopoly of school activities. Our children's time is no has encroached upon it until it has invaded the sacred precincts of has evaded the sacred precincts of the Lord's Day. And those children who want to do their duty and whose parents do not care, feel themselves marked out as peculiar. It is much easier to talk of the totalarian control of children in Germany and Italy than it is of the same thing in America. While in those countries the authority says they must submit, in our own land the authority makes it extremely hard not to do so.

"I am sure we ought to be very vigilant in every community lest there grow up a tradition that militates against the church's freedom to teach our children the faith of the fathers and founders of our republic. They were Christian men who cared for their religion enough to safeguard its outposts."

The convocation opened Saturday, with 33 delegates in attendance. Guests of honor were Bishop Frank Wilson of Eau Claire, and Miss Edna B. Beardsley, assistant secretary of the Women's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Episcopal Church.

PICKETING ORDINANCE

REVIEW BEING SOUGHT RENO-Asking the Nevada Supreme court to set aside Judge T. F. Morans decision which held the city anti-picketing ordinance unconstitutional, City Attorney D. A. Busey filed a petition for a writ of review with the high court.

In his petition Busey asserts that the district countt descision was in error, and asserts that the city measure is constitutional and within the powers of the city conucil.

The city picketing case rose last year when two men were arrested for picketing a Reno wholesale warehouse, which had been blacklisted by the truck driver's union. The pickets were convicted and fined \$10 at police court hearing, then appealed their conviction to the district court. After many delays, the hearing was held on March 11th of this year and on June 2, Judge Moran handed down his decision which held the city ordinance unconstitutional.
