

Guard Against Boat Accidents

This is the season of small boat accidents states the Bureau of Marine Inspection and Navigation, Department of Commerce, in issuing the following "Don'ts" to vacationists.

- Don't overload the boat. No boat is safe overloaded.
- Don't rock the boat (That's like saying, "I didn't know it was loaded.")
- Don't try to show off in a boat.
- Don't fool in a boat.
- Don't change seats in a small boat.
- Don't venture too far in a small boat.
- Don't brave a thunder squall. Seek

- shelter in time.
- Don't take chances when non-swimmers are along.
- Don't forget spare oars and anchor.
- Don't fail to provide life belts for children.
- Don't expose others while you are learning.
- Don't be afraid of a boat—respect it.
- Small sail boats must be cautiously handled.
- Don't make fast the main sheet.
- Don't jibe in a heavy wind.
- Don't be afraid to shorten sail.
- Don't attempt to carry sail thru a thunder squall.
- Motor boats have particular hazards.
- Don't take chances with fire and explosion.
- Don't tolerate an installation which lacks modern safeguards.
- Don't allow gas or oil in the bilge.

- Don't forget your wake can damage others.
- Don't operate near swimmers in the water.
- Violation of these ordinary precautions can bring disaster.
- Since the craze for bass fishing has arrived at Lake Mead, the necessity for observing all possible precautions is emphasized. A little

care will result in preventing the loss of many lives in the next few years. Lake Mead, like any other large inland lake, is perfectly tractable and safe under ordinary conditions. But, when there is a wind blowing or sudden squalls come sweeping over the water there is danger even to those experienced in the handling of boats.
