"We stood there when Ward drove up in a car. I stepped onto the running board, opened the car door and told Ward to put up his hands. I was very nervous.

"Ward suddenly made a motion toward his back pocket. I went cold all over, and without meaning to, I squeezed the trigger.

"I don't know how many times the gun went off. Then it jammed.

"Bert went around to the other side of the car and we got in and drove off. We took \$80 from Ward who was sitting between us, bleeding badly but still conscious.

"About a mile away, we let Ward out and then abandoned the car."

Anderson said they then awoke King's brother, who lives in Fresno, and had him drive them to the mountains. At Big Creek, 55 miles northeast of Fresno, they got out of the car, divided the loot and separated.

Anderson said he stayed in the mountains from July 17, the day of the shooting, until July 19, when he returned to Fresno and then went by bus to Los Angeles.

After visiting his father, Ralph Gilliland, in Alhambra, he said he hitch-hiked to Ogden, Utah, and then returned to Las Vegas, where he was captured.

Chief of Police Dave Mackey of Las Vegas, who questioned Anderson at length after his arrest in Boulder City, said that while the Vegas youth steadfastly denied the murder, while here, he told him he had been "rum-dum" for four or five weeks.

"Anderson had a love affair with a young woman who came to Las Vegas for a divorce," Mackey said. "She left here and returned to Fresno, ostensibly to marry another man. Anderson followed her.

"He said he got to drinking pretty steadily when things didn't go so well with the girl, and that he didn't remember much that happened during that period," the Las Vegas chief said.

Anderson is alleged to be a dope addict using the most destructive of the habit forming drugs, heroin to excess for some months.

## Predicament In Mexican Policy

Almost four months have passed since President Cardenas of Mexico and his labor associates seized the properties of seventeen foreign oil companies. To date, the story is one of decreased production, lowered refinery runs, lessened employment, wage reductions, inferior products and near economic collapse.

Great Britain has withdrawn her ambassador after issuing a flat demand that the properties of the British companies be returned. The United States has sent a note acknowledging Mexico's right to expropriate foreign properties, provided she was prepared to pay their just value in good money. Without credit, Mexican bonds would not be acceptable.

The peso, worth 28c when expropriation occurred, is now down to 20c. The number of jobs has been diminished and the cost of living has taken a violent jump. The status of 18,000 workers is lower than it was before the expropriation.

If these matters concerned only the oil companies and the Mexican people they would not disturb the average citizen of the United States. Unfortunately, part of the cost of Mexico's action falls on us. There are some 30,000 investors in the United States who are the real owners, through their companies, of the oil properties. They have a right to demand that Mexico return the properties or buy them at their just value. There are a larger number of citizens engaged in the products going into the export business, who are likewise losers. Unable to sell the seized oil in the United States, Mexico has been ducing and manufacture of producing it to foreign countries for equipment and supplies formerly bought in this country. The biggest purchaser to date has been Germany.

Our State Department has followed a policy of kindly patience. This has apparently been misunderstood by the Mexicans as tacit approval of their action. It seems to be time for the State Department to take further action in such a manner as to be understandable to the Mexican government.

## Fifteen Hundred Miles Of Smiles

EL CENTRO, Cal., July 26, '38—Smiles, 1500 miles of them are broadening along the International Four States Highway, U. S. 93, all the way from Canada to Mexico, because actual construction work has started and is well under way on the single unconstructed gap on the route, being the 40-mile sector between Niland, extending northeast to a point 25 miles west of Bly he in the Valley of the Colorado River in California. Under the direction of A. C. Fulmof, county engineer of Riverside county who has been placed in charge of the engineering features of the project, County Commissioner Byron M. Graham of Brawley, Cal., in whose road district a large portion of this stretch of highway lies, and R. G. E'more, road district foreman of this section of Southern California, are at present some of the busiest men in the West, trying to get this 40 miles of highway graded through in time to permit the Southern California motorcade, en route to the Twin Falls convention on September 24th, to pass over the new road. All three have solemnly promised that the road will be passable for this traffic a couple of days before the Twin Falls convention is called to order by President Harland E. Wells of Whitefish, Mont.

### Old Stage Station

The new 40-mile link in the route goes by what remains of one of the old rock stations of the Bradshaw Stage Line, a busy passenger and express carrier in the years following 1862 when rich placer gold was discovered at La Paz and Ehrenberg in Arizona, on the Colo-

rado River near what is now Blythe, California. The Bradshaw Stage Line extended from San Bernardino to the river at La Paz and carried miners, mail, express, gold and bad men of the West during the Civil War period.

The stage station at Chuckawalla Wells, close to where the new road is being built, was an important stopping place and it will be an important point of interest 75 years later on the new International Four States highway.

### Construction at Searchlight

Other cheering construction news comes from Oliver Goerman, secretary of the Las Vegas Chamber of Commerce, and assistant secretary of the International Four States Highway association. Completion of the Las Vegas-Searchlight sector to old Searchlight is now planned for early spring and possibly sooner, Nevada State Highway Engineer Robert A. Allen has just advised Goerman.
