Oddie Reenters

Tasker L. Oddie, whose distinguished services to the state and nation during his twelve years in the United States Senate are held in appreciation by the people of Neyada, reentered public life this week after the urgent solicitation of many friends of both parties.

In announcing his candidacy for th United States Senate, Senator Oddie will become the opponent at the general election of the Democratic candidate who shall be nominated at the coming primary election.

Senator Oddie's career since he came to Nevada in the late years of the last century as a young mining engineer, is a thraling story of high integrity, dogged determinunquenchable optiand mism such as only a great man could create.


At Belmont, he started his mining career and when backing failed and the outlook became dark he conquered all obstacles by sinking a shaft singlehanded. He drilled the holes for the blasts, loaded them with giant powder, cap and fuse, lighted the fuse in each hole, then climbed the long ladder to the surface. After the blasts went off and the smoke and gas cleared away, the young engineer lowered the bucket by means of a crude windlass, then climed down the ladder, filled the bucket with the broken rock, climed to the surface, hoisted the bucket by the windlass, emptied the muck and then repeated the operation again and again as long as strength lasted. And each morning saw him again on the job.

His association with Jim Butler, a prospector, also a resident of Belmont led to the discovery of the great silver mines of Tonopah which, after nearly forty years are still pouring out their riches to the world.

Butler returned one day, worn and weary after a long prospecting trip. He went to Oddie's cabin said he was broke and asked his friend if he would get some ore samples assayed, offering a half interest in whatever claims might be located. Oddie was himself in financial distress, but nevertheless, on his first trip to town after supplies, he took the samples and had them assayed. Then for the first time the great value of that peculiar type of ore was realized.

Oddie hurried back to Belmont and found his friend Jim Butler had gone on another long prospecting trip. It was three months after the ore was found that Jim Butler returned and was told by Oddie of. (Continued on page Two)
