Recognized as pioneers in the airconditioning of railroad passenger cars, the Union Pacific will now be the first railroad in the world to "light-condition" a railway car, W. M. Jeffers revealed this week.

Coupled with this startling statement, Mr. Jeffers announced that the Union Pacific's Diesel-electric streamliner, the "City of Los Angeles," will soon be enlarged to meet the ever-increasing demands of the traveling public for accommodations on the train by the addition of an all-room sleeping car and a full length observation car. The latter will be "The Copper King," the world's first "light-conditioned" car, a sensationally new observation lounge car. This car, the railroad president said, will embody not onlny the last word in scientific streamline development breath-taking with its bold interior decorations of sparkling copperbut will be the first railroad car anywhere to use that miraculous new product, Polaroid, as windows.
